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
Finding God

14th Sunday in Ordinary Time Bible Sunday 8 July 2018

Ez 2:2-5 2 Cor 12:7-10 Mk 6:1-6

The late Archbishop Fulton Sheen observed in his book "The Life of Christ" that only the poor shepherds and the Wise Men found Jesus in the manger. The shepherds represent the simple-minded, and the Wise Men represent the learned. Only these two classes of people ever find God; the simple because they know that they know nothing; and the learned because they know that they do not know everything. There is a third class of people who never find God - those who think they know. "Not even God can tell the proud anything! Only the humble can find God."

Thus, the tone of questioning in today's Gospel reading, from the people of Jesus' own home town, gives a distinct impression of a lack of humility. "Where did the man get all this? What is this wisdom that has been granted him, and these miracles that are worked through him? This is the carpenter, surely..." (Mk 6:2-3). While there is a hint of praise, there is also the underlying sneer on his lowly background and the snobbery of the inquisitors who think they know better. The self-pride or lack of humility blinded those who questioned Jesus and prevented them from recognising the fact that they are in truth looking at and hearing from God himself! "Divinity is always where one least expects to find it." (Archbishop Fulton Sheen)



If we sincerely examine ourselves, it will not be difficult to recognise that we often unconsciously blind ourselves to God through our selfpride and lack of humility. Too often, we sit at Mass listening to the homily thinking to ourselves - "This priest is a terrible speaker! His homily is so uninspiring!"; and we switch off our hearing, allowing our minds to drift away to "more important" thoughts in our busy lives. Outside of church, we often draw quick conclusions on the worthiness of a person by the way he is dressed, coiffered and speaks before we really know the person. Thus, too often, we fail to recognise God when he is in our midst and in turn God can work no miracles in hearts that are clogged with pride and illusion of selfsufficiency.

Thankfully, God knows and loves us better than we know and love ourselves, and therefore he gives us all necessary grace to overcome our pride that prevents us from recognising him. This truth is related to us by St. Paul in the second reading. With an abundance of revelations from Jesus to him, St. Paul could easily drift into a state of being where he feels

he is superior to all his fellow men. Such a superiority complex could well turn people off from his efforts to proclaim the Gospel and evangelise. Therefore, God permitted a "thorn" to be in St. Paul, in order to manifest his grace and to keep St. Paul humble, for the sake of his own soul and the conversion of more souls to Christ! (2 Cor 12:7)

Furthermore, not only will God give us all necessary grace, he will never stop trying to bring us to holiness even if we are a stubborn lot - and we are stubborn! The first reading attest to this fact when God sends Ezekiel to the Israelites to give them warnings about turning away from God, even when God knows that they are defiant and obstinate. The love of God for his created beings never diminishes even when we, time and again, spurn his efforts to make us holy.

This being Bible Sunday, may we all meditate upon God's Word today and pray that we are open enough to feel the thorn at our side so that we can remain humble in order to see, hear and feel God's guiding hand in our lives.

The Bible came alive for us!

44 participants of the SFX Sunday Bible Class made a 2-week pilgrimage to the Holy Land in June, under the spiritual direction of Fr Marc Lim. Organised by the SFX Bible Apostolate Team (BAT), the trip enabled the pilgrims to discover the cultural, historical and topographical landscapes of the land of the Gospels. Appropriate Bible verses were read at each Holy Land site to allow for prayerful contemplation. Every evening, the pilgrims gathered for a time of prayer, reflection, consolidation and sharing. This helped to keep everyone focused on the purpose of the pilgrimage growth in knowledge and strength of faith as a Bible Class community as we allowed Jesus to touch us and heal us during our sojourn in His homeland.

In Israel, our pilgrimage began in Galilee, where we visited the places where Jesus grew up, ministered, preached, healed and worked miracles. On route to Judea from Galilee, we passed through Sychar and visited the site where Jesus asked the Samaritan woman for a drink of water. There we drank from Jacob's Well, which has been yielding fresh water for the last






3500 years. At Nazareth, Bethlehem and Jerusalem, we stayed within walking distance of the Churches of the Annunciation, the Nativity and the Holy Sepulchre respectively. This made it convenient for those of us who wished to rise early in the morning to pray for at least an hour at these churches before breakfast. We treasured these times of quietude and contemplation at the Annunciation Cave, the Manger Grotto and the Rock of Calvary. The highlight of our stay in Jerusalem was undoubtedly the mass celebrated by Fr Marc at the Tomb of Christ, a rare privilege and a spirit-filled experience which moved many of us profoundly.

Each of us came away from the pilgrimage changed in some way, not least because we were able to relate much of what we experienced in the Holy Land with what we had been studying and reading in the Bible. As a group, we received many graces, healings and spiritual encounters during the trip. Going forward, it is important for us to use these graces to urge each other on in our faith journey, all the while

praying that the Spirit will guide and strengthen us as a community and add to our numbers.

FUNERAL


