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Fed by His Body, Nourished by His Word

21st Sunday in Ordinary Time 26 August 2018

Jos 24:1-2, 15-18 Eph 5:21-32 Jn 6:60-69

This Sunday's gospel picks up immediately after last Sunday's. Unable to accept Christ's proclamation that his "flesh is real food" and his "blood is real drink" (Jn 6:55), many of Christ's disciples abandon him, preferring to cling to their own beliefs than embrace the Word of God. At times we too struggle to accept the teachings of Christ, be it on the Eucharist, Forgiveness, Suffering or the Sanctity of Life.

When faced with difficulties in understanding or following the divine realities of God, like the so-called "disciples" in today's gospel, we reject his word; choosing only to believe what conforms to our own worldview. Seduced by the relativistic and secular trends of modern society, we may even attempt to justify ourselves by claiming that the teachings of Holy Mother Church are just "man-made rules", perhaps even living double lives as a Catholic on Sundays and a person of the world for the rest of the week (Pope Francis, Morning Meditation, 17 November 2015).

When we nitpick only the elements of faith we want and attempt to bespoke a religion that is convenient to follow, when we claim to love God

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

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yet challenge his teachings through our deeds and beliefs, we fall prey to "buffet discipleship". This form of discipleship withholds complete faith in God's Word; demanding love without obedience, reward without labour, and mercy without sacrifice.

Buffet discipleship cannot be counted as true discipleship because it seeks to place ourselves -not God- at the centre of our faith, constituting more of a marriage of convenience than a bond of love. Because convenient unions are neither strong nor lasting, such discipleship will soon see us assuaged by other seemingly more attractive unions which sell us comfortable lies instead of challenging us to face uncomfortable truths.

God who exists independently of our love does not need to sell us anything for he does not require our love nor discipleship to exist, instead choosing to love us superfluous creatures into existence in order to perfect us. Reflecting on this, C.S. Lewis likens God to "a 'host' who deliberately creates his own parasites...that we may exploit and 'take advantage of ' him". God is the "diagram of Love himself, the inventor of all loves" (The Four Loves). It is for this reason that God gave his only Son for us; that we come to perfection and obtain eternal life (cf Jn 3:16). Because man does not live on bread alone, but by the words that proceeds from the mouth of God (Mt 4:4), Christ, the Word Made Flesh, as the incarnation of God's word and flesh is both the sacrifice of our redemption and nourishment for our souls. True and perfect discipleship thus requires us to receive Christ's body in the Eucharist as well as live out his commands (*Evangelii Gaudium 121*, 180-183). Beyond mere obedience, this requires love which is neither conditional nor convenient (Eph 5:21-32).

Cultivating this love will therefore make us better disciples and help us to accept even the most "intolerable" of Christ's teachings. For a start, let us resolve, like the Israelites at Shechem (Jos 24:1-1,15-18), to definitively choose to serve and be disciples of God removing ourselves from the centre of our lives and placing him at the very heart of our lives.

Even as we strive to yield ourselves over to God, we can rejoice that through the Eucharist, Jesus himself is helping us to be conformed to him as he revealed to St Augustine, "I am the food of strong men; grow, and you shall feed upon me; nor shall you convert me, like the food of your flesh, into you, but you shall be converted into me" (Confessions).

CHARISMATIC LISS






Theme for Sept: Prayer

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Lay Apostolate Sunday

This weekend we celebrate Lay Apostolate Sunday. On this day, we, the laity, are reminded that as part of the Body of Christ, we are called to an important mission.





What is Lay Apostolate and what is our mission?

The decree on the apostolate of laity, Apostolicam Actuositatem, by the Second Vatican Council, expresses that "the Church was founded for the purpose of spreading the kingdom of Christ throughout the earth for the glory of God the Father, to enable all men to share in his saving redemption, and that through them the whole world might enter into a relationship with Christ. All activity of the Mystical Body directed to the attainment of this goal is called the apostolate, which the Church carries on in various ways through all her members".

In summary, apostolate is the activity that members of the Body of Christ carries out to spread the kingdom of God. We, the lay people, by virtue that we are living in the midst of the world and are embroiled in its developments, are thus called by God to make our faith present and fruitful in the world – that is, to make Christ's real presence felt by others as we live our ordinary, everyday lives.



How is Lay Apostolate and Lay Ministry different?

Lay apostolate can be differentiated from lay ministry through its purpose. Lay ministry's purpose is to serve a particular need of the parish. Lay ministries are indeed essential for the smooth running of the church and growing the faith of its members. While lay ministry is performed within the church setting, lay apostolate work is done in the secular world. The fundamental call as a lay Christian disciple, through our baptism, is to respond to the needs of the world – the greatest being the need for Christ.



How can we live out our vocation in our daily lives?

As ambassadors of Christ, we are called to be salt and light of the world (Matthew 5:13-16). As salt of the earth, we should strive to add positive flavour to the people around us, building them up with words of encouragement and actions of love. In a world that does not know Christ, we, the lay people, become the light to shine people to Jesus. We are challenged to exercise our faith in words and deeds, so that through our lives, we reveal God's love to our fellow men.

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
