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The Human Family: an Icon of God

Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph 30 Dec 2018

Sir 3:2-6, 12-14 Col 3:12-21 Lk 2:41-52

A few days ago, we celebrated the Solemnity of the Nativity of the Lord where the Holy Family with the new-born Infant was first presented to us. Luke tells us that the shepherds had hurried to Bethlehem to see for themselves the new-born savior as revealed by an angel. They would find there an infant "wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger". In Bethlehem they were in awe as they beheld "Mary and Joseph, and the baby lying in the manger".

In just ten verses, Luke mentions three times that the Infant Jesus was in a "manger" - a feeding trough (Lk 2:7,12,16). Luke wants to impress on the reader that lesus has come to offer himself as food to renew the world. Today, all of us are deeply grateful that Jesus continues to feed, heal and build us up at the Tables of the Word and Eucharist - the two parts of the Mass. We acknowledged this in the General Intercessions at Christmas when we prayed, "Make a new beginning with us, Lord." Enlightened by Scripture or having received the lavish and rich fare from the "Table of God's word" (Sacrosanctum Concilium 51), we become more aware of how Christ has blessed us and are able to offer prayers to God for the salvation of all.

The first place to share the joy of this "new beginning" in Christ is the family.

Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI says it is significant that "God wanted to be born and to grow up in a human family". In choosing the holy family of Joseph and Mary, God " ... consecrated the family as the first and ordinary means of his encounter with humanity...the human family thus became an icon of God! God is the Trinity, he is a communion of love... The human family, in a certain sense, is an icon of the Trinity because of its interpersonal love and the fruitfulness of this love" (Angelus, 2006, 2009).


This "fruitfulness" is not limited to procreation. The Catechism tells us, "The fruitfulness of conjugal love extends to the fruits of the moral, spiritual and supernatural life that parents hand on to their children by education...It is in the bosom of the family that parents are 'by word and example...the first heralds of the faith with regard to their children'... Thus the home is the first school of Christian life" (CCC1656-1657). Today's first and second readings describe the hallmarks of a Christian household - obedience and respect towards parents; compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience among family members so that the peace of Christ radiates in a Christian home.

In today's gospel, Luke writes of Joseph and Mary as being our role models for the passing on of the faith in the family. Joseph and Mary have always brought

Jesus to the annual pilgrimage feast of Passover in Jerusalem (cf Lk 2:41). However, on this particular pilgrimage when Jesus was twelve years old, he had stayed behind in the Temple and was found "sitting among the doctors, listening to them, and asking them questions" - questions which Jesus himself answered, thus feeding and nourishing their spiritual void, for Luke writes that the religious leaders "were astounded at his intelligence and his replies" (Lk 1:47). Luke also shows here that by this time, Jesus had already become aware of his identity as God's son, telling Mary and Joseph, "Why were you looking for me? Did you not know that I must be busy with my Father's affairs?" (Lk 2:49). Jesus' reply reveals to us that "it is necessary first of all to do God's will, and that the spiritual bond is worth more than the bond of kinship" (Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI).

In this octave of Christmas as we continue to contemplate God coming to share in our humanity through the human family, may parents welcome the mission God has entrusted to them, "The Christian family is aware that children are a gift and a project of God.... it cannot consider that it possesses them, the family is called to educate them in the greatest freedom, which is precisely that of saying 'yes' to God in order to do his will" (Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI, 2009).

A Treasure in the Forest

Madeleine Tan reflects on the recent SiGN mission trip to Myanmar.



It's easy to miss the woody and almost hidden entrance to the Nazareth Bush School (NBS) in Myanmar, yet as Fr Benjamjn of NBS aptly puts it, "hundreds drive pass each day without knowing and move on with their lives; yet those who do find themselves venturing into the woods to discover the treasure.. there they remain".

This quote resonates with my experience during the SiGN mission this year. Last year, I made a promise

to the children of NBS to return to Myanmar. "God, this is me holding up my end of the deal" were the words that marked a journey of rediscovering the presence of God.

From the soulful singing of the children to the heartfelt hospitality of the priests and caretakers, the cheery conversations with the youth, or generosity of the people, each moment reflected man's immense capacity to love God and others.

I was compelled to re-examine my love for Jesus and how that translates into action. In particular, I was moved by the children's profound hunger, for God, knowledge, and something more than what this world can offer. I wondered how a seed of such longing and faith could flourish in a place of material lack. If we are but a mere dim and imperfect reflection of God, how vast and deep can Love itself possibly be then?

My only fitting response: "*Stir up a deeper faith in me*". Therein a place of such simplicity yet immense love lies the call to keep my gaze on my Maker, the source of all life, love and joy.

The children asked me again on the last night, "Will you come back again next year, and bring your friends to meet us please?" This reflection is my invitation to you, to come and meet the pure hearts of NBS.
