The Historicity of the Resurrection

Easter Sunday of The Lord's Resurrection 21 Apr 2019

Ac 10:34, 37-43 Col 3:1-4 Jn 20:1-9

Christianity is anchored in history. Within years of Jesus' lifetime, historical records mention him. Such records include those by Jewish historian Flavius Josephus in AD93 and Roman politicians Pliny and Tacitus (second century AD). None of these people even liked Jesus; but few debated whether Jesus lived and died.

The more interesting question however, is whether Jesus died and lived

There are three key facts that support a case for the Resurrection. These facts can be established without relying on the accuracy of the New Testament; even non-Christian historians assent to these three facts.

First, Jesus' tomb was empty. Otherwise, no one would be foolish enough to believe a man had resurrected when his body lay dead in the tomb. And yet, Jesus' disciples began preaching the Resurrection in Jerusalem itself, the city that Jesus had died and been buried in. As theologian Paul Althaus argued, the Resurrection proclamation "could not have been maintained in Jerusalem for a single day, a single hour, if the emptiness of the tomb had not been established as a fact for all concerned."

Critically, the Jews themselves did not



deny the empty tomb, and instead attempted to refute the Resurrection with the narrative that the disciples had stolen Jesus' body (see Mt 28:11-15). But this conspiracy theory is easily refuted, which brings us to the next point.

Second, the first Christians believed that they had encountered the Risen Lord. Multiple early sources (apart from the New Testament) record testimony of eyewitnesses encountering Jesus after his crucifixion. The honesty of these eyewitnesses cannot be doubted. As the late Nabeel Qureshi wrote in Seeking Allah, Finding Jesus, "Liars make poor martyrs."

Furthermore, such testimonies cannot be dismissed as hallucinations because they came from independent witnesses that corroborated each other (see 1 Cor 15:3-8). The hallucination theory also cannot explain the empty tomb.

Third, the early Christian Church believed in and preached the Resurrection. Unlike myths that develop over generations, the Resurrection was preached within months of Jesus' death. As CS Lewis points out in Miracles, "an 'apostle' was first and foremost a man who claimed to be an eyewitness of the Resurrection... to preach Christianity meant primarily to preach



the Resurrection...The Resurrection is the central theme in every Christian sermon reported in the Acts."

In this regard, the Resurrection was wholly original. Judaism in the first century had no concept of a single individual rising from the dead; the Jews believed in being raised together at the end of time (cf Jn 11:24).

In Jesus of Nazareth: From the Entrance into Jerusalem to the Resurrection, Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI describes the uniqueness of the risen Christ: "He was quite different, no mere resuscitated corpse, but one living anew and forever in the power of God... It was an utterly unique experience, which burst open the normal boundaries of experience and yet for the disciples was guite beyond doubt. This explains the unique character of the Resurrection accounts: they speak of something paradoxical, of something that surpasses all experience and yet is utterly real and present."

Such novelty, improbable as it may be, precludes theories that the Resurrection was a myth constructed from other existing ideas. And once the impossible is eliminated, whatever remains, no matter how improbable, must be the truth.

And here is the Truth: Christ is risen, Alleluia!




Rebuild My Church, Restore My People

As our church undergoes changes to her physical structure, some of our parishioners have been going through spiritual renewal as well. For the last 3 Mondays, Module 1 on Discipleship and Prayer has seen many coming to church on Monday nights to listen and learn more about the discipline and methods of prayer. On 25 Mar, Mike Arents (*Parish Pastoral Executive at Church of the Immaculate Heart of Mary*) introduced why prayer was important and how to use Lectio Divina to have a deeper prayer relationship with the Lord.

The subsequent 2 weeks saw Lance Ng (Spiritual Director at Kingsmead Centre) introduce other methods of prayer with the Awareness Examen, Journaling and Ignatian Contemplation. He also spoke on what discernment is and what it is not. By practising mindfulness and learning how to relax and concentrate on each day, Lance demonstrated how we can try and use the Examen to bring out those dark feelings into the light, to bring these to our Lord and place them at his feet, thus releasing these negative feelings and ensuring that these do not turn into resentment and make us "sleepwalk" through life.

For those who may want to learn more about Ignatian Contemplation, Lance will return on **Wed 1 May from 8.30am to 12.30pm** in **SFX Main Church** to help us experience this form of imaginative prayer and give us some practical tips and methods on how to practise it.





An Unexpected Journey...

Fr Don reflects on the recent SiGN mission trip to Myanmar.



Well, for sure... the title is not mine and a Tolkien fan or a Peter Jackson movie enthusiast would certainly announce loudly the fraud! But this title crossed my mind when I began to write this reflection about my recent trip to Myanmar from 29 March to 3 April with two other members of SFX SiGN group (Sowers in God's Name). I was invited to "come and see" the work by our parish group in a remote and impoverished area of Myanmar.

In the movie I referred to, the main character - a young hobbit called Bilbo Baggins - together with a group of dwarves, embarked on a journey which would lead him in a journey of self discovery through adventures, challenges and companionship. It was the same for me. Of course I am not talking about the dwarves companionship - my two companions were a bit taller! But by journeying with them in unknown lands, I enjoyed particularly the time spent together to speak about almost everything: missionary work, personal experiences, their lives, food (how to forget that!), and of course, faith too... The kind of trip we embarked on gave us opportunities to know each other in a different context which liberated our conversations. And since we were sharing almost everything : the spiders, the cockroaches, the bucket shower, the morning wake-up call by roosters (I had dreams of grilled chickens, or chicken-rice)... we could talk about the essentials in life!

We went to serve and help our friends. And the first one was Fr Benjamin who welcomed us at the airport. This local "Gandalf" drove us to the Nazareth Bush School which he started approximately 25 years ago. This developed into a larger local community in the diocese of Pathein, near Myaungmya (South-west from Yangon), where he is now helped by Fr Celestine and the orphans who grew up within the community. I was personally impressed by all the work already accomplished in this place - farming, tests in padi seed production, cashew nut processing and trading, education and formation of the younger generations etc. I could quickly sense Fr Ben's determination to create a sustainable community for his people. While our friend dedicated all his time and energy for the development of the community, I could also see his faith in action, especially his confidence in God's providence and his inner peace (even when ants enter his cassock during mass!).

Now, my unexpected journey is at an end but the adventure continues. I think the journey was unexpectedly good for all of us because the Lord always plans gifts and surprises to the willing hearts despite initial questions and maybe even subconscious fears.

Let's pray now for a sequel to come.
