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Growing the Seed of Faith

Making Disciples

27th Sunday in Ordinary Time 6 Oct 2019

Hab 1:2-3, 2:2-4 2 Tim 1:6-8. 13-14 Lk 17:5-10

Two decades ago, Pope St John Paul II wrote in his encyclical *Fides et Ratio* ("On the Relationship Between Faith & Reason", 1998) that "in the far reaches of the human heart there is a seed of desire and nostalgia for God."

In order to seek God, know his will and live in truth, he says that God has given us the twin gifts of faith and reason, "Faith and reason are like two wings on which the human spirit rises to the contemplation of truth; and God has placed in the human heart a desire to know the truth - in a word, to know himself – so that, by knowing and loving God, men and women may also come to the fullness of truth about themselves." That truth about ourselves is that God made us, we belong to him and are led by his hand (cf Ps 94).

Our search for God however, must firstly be from a sincere or "upright" disposition as today's first reading emphasizes. God has revealed to us the truth through his written word "to be easily read" (Hab 2:2). However, the one "whose soul is not at rights" will choose to read his own purposes into God's revealed word, thereby causing confusion and leading others astray (Hab 2:4). The 2nd Vatican Dogmatic Constitution Council's on Divine Revelation, Dei Verbum, tells us to be on our guard and seek



the coherence between Scripture, Tradition and Magisterial Teaching, "Sacred Tradition and Sacred Scripture comprise a single sacred deposit of the word of God... The 'supreme rule of her faith' derives from the unity which the Spirit has created between Sacred Tradition, Sacred Scripture and the Magisterium of the Church... which means that none of the three can survive without the others." (FR 55, DV 21)

In addition to having an "upright" or sincere heart to seek God, our pursuit to know God better also requires perseverance and an active faith on our part. Hence, St Paul tells Timothy in today's second reading to "fan into a flame" the gift of God's Spirit which Timothy received when St Paul laid his hands on him. All of us have similarly received God's Spirit at our baptism when the priest laid his hands on us. At the Sacrament of Confirmation which completes our initiation into the faith, we receive "the special outpouring of the Holy Spirit as once granted to the apostles on the day of Pentecost." (CCC 1302)

Like Timothy and the apostles, we too, may be hesitant or "timid" to acknowledge this gift. We need to be reminded that "God's gift was not a spirit of timidity, but the Spirit of power, and love, and self-control." (2 Tim 1:7) Faith is directed to works as Jesus tells his apostles, "Were your

faith the size of a mustard seed you could say to this mulberry tree, 'Be uprooted and planted in the sea', and it would obey you." This work is humble and persevering evangelisation: "... when you have done all you have been told to do, say, 'We are merely servants: we have done no more than our duty." (Lk 17:5,10)

We are called today to reflect on what we have done with this "seed of desire and nostalgia for God". Have we been growing through his written Word? Do we have an "upright" disposition? Are we humble yet bold in evangelising to others?

His Grace, Archbishop William Goh encourages us to work on an informed and certain faith, "Faith and reason always go together... theology, which is a systematic study of our faith...can provide credibility in our beliefs in Christ. But certainty of faith in Christ...comes through our personal encounter with the Lord in worship, both as individuals and as a community...Theology is not mere intellectual knowledge but a living relationship with the Lord. We know Him to love Him and to serve Him." (Reflection, 26 Jan 2019, Feast of Sts Timothy and Titus)

Let us surrender ourselves to be set ablaze by the Holy Spirit today so that God's love revealed in Christ may be known throughout the world!

Why don't we wear our Sunday best to Church anymore?



In the Golden Temple in Amritsa, the holiest site of the Sikh religion, visitors are asked to remove their shoes and socks, even to wear a handkerchief on their head as a sort of "turban", to wash their hands, and then traverse a small pool of water before stepping inside - barefoot.

I have visited Buddhist temples in which I'm not allowed in if my legs or shoulders are bare.

Why then, when scanning the pews during Mass in our church, is it not uncommon to find parishioners in slippers or home clothes – in short, their SUNDAY WORST?

Why do we not dress up for Mass?

Jesus cares more about what's inside than outside, some people argue. Others say he's like my BFF who loves me the way I am.

The truth is, wearing nice clothes doesn't make one a better Catholic. In fact, we're certainly not asking parishioners to come dressed to kill in designer items and finery. But there is a big difference between someone who comes to church neatly attired

in clothes that may not be as "nice" because they don't have the time, energy or money and someone who dresses sloppily for Mass because they just can't be bothered.

We dress up for date nights, when meeting our bosses or clients. Is it too much to ask to dress up for one hour a week to meet with the King of Kings? Shouldn't we have that same reverential attitude when we show up at church to meet God? After all, doesn't our outfit reveal the importance we attach to an occasion? If Mass matters, then what we wear matters. It just shows where our heart is at.

Mass is about worshiping God. It's important enough that Catholics are required to go every week. We believe that a miracle happens every Mass wherein our God comes to us in the form of bread and wine. So, it makes sense to dress up for Mass more than you would for say, a sporting event or a day of errands. There should be some sort of approach to God that will include certain steps to honour the God who is not our buddy but ... GOD!


Reverence and love

When you attend Mass,

- Do you treat it as something special, something sacred? Or is it just another item on your to-do list?

When you get dressed, are you thinking about what will make YOU look good and draw attention to you, or are you thinking about THE ONE you are there to celebrate?

THESE are the questions we need to be asking ourselves. And when we do, appropriate dress will follow.



Community, Ministry & Mission

God has a mission for all of us. But have we ever thought seriously about this mission?

Mike Arents shared in his enlightening session during last week's session of the Parish Formation Programme that God calls us to evangelise, to spread his word. Mike highlighted that in Evangelii Gaudium 120, it is stated that, "In virtue of their baptism, all the members of the people of God have become missionary disciples (cf. Mt 28:19)". What this means is that evangelisation should be carried out not only by our priests and religious but all the rest of us baptised Catholics who may think we can get by just being passive recipients of God's word.

For us to be able to evangelise, we have to be true disciples of Jesus Christ. Being a disciple of Christ is more than just pronouncing that you believe in him. It is also about living the faith and acting based upon his teachings.

-3 Elements in Discipleship .

According to Mike, there are 3 elements in discipleship:-

1. Solitude

which is our own personal prayer life and relationship with God;

2. Community

which involves praying together as a community and;

3. Mission

which is looking towards what we should do for others.

God loves us so much that he wants us to grow in wisdom and in faith. Being in a community not only helps us to achieve this but can also strengthen our resolve to serve God.
