The Divine Romance: The Blessed Trinity

Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity 16 Jun 2019 Prov 8:22-31 Rom 5:1-5 Jn 16:12-15

Today, the Church invites us to contemplate anew the mystery of the Most Holy Trinity -"the central mystery of the Christian faith and of Christian life" (CCC 261). We profess that "we worship one God in the Trinity and the Trinity in unity, without either confusing the persons or dividing the substance; for the person of the Father is one, the Son's is another, the Holy Spirit's another; but the Godhead of the Father, Son and the Holy Spirit is one, their glory equal, their majesty coeternal" (CCC 266). Jesus came to reveal that God's innermost life "...is an eternal exchange of love, Father, Son and Holy Spirit". This revelation is given to us because "...he has destined us to share in that exchange" (CCC 221).

In an address delivered in 1930 entitled "The Divine Romance", the Venerable Fulton Sheen used analogies to help our finite minds grasp the mystery of the Trinity. He began by stating that created in the image of God, we can think. Our thoughts are a part of us. For some, their thoughts carry so much of their personality and spirit that those thoughts bear their imprint like the philosophical and spiritual thoughts of Plato, Dante, St Thomas Aquinas, etc.

Applying this analogy to God, Venerable Sheen says, "Since God is an infinite

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Spirit, His thought will not be a mere feeble reflection but rather a thought reaching to the abyss of all things that are known and can be known. Into this thought God will put Himself so entirely that it is as living as Himself, infinite as Himself, perfect as Himself. If a human genius can put his whole personality into a thought...in a more perfect way God is able to put so much of Himself into a thought that it is conscious of itself and is a Divine Person."

This infinite "Thought" of God is called both Word and Son because "Word... indicate[s] that He is the Wisdom of God". He is also called "Son" because "Just as in our own human order the principal of all human generation is called the Father, so too in the Trinity the principal of the spiritual generation is called the Father and what is generated is called the Son, because it is the perfect image and resemblance of the Father."

Explaining the co-eternity of the Son with the Father, Venerable Sheen said, "The Father is not first, and then thinks – the Father and Son are co-eternal, for in God all is present and unchanging.... Thus it is that the Father, contemplating His Image, His Word, His Son, can say in the ecstasy of the first and real paternity: 'Thou art my Son; this day have I begotten Thee.'"

On the Third Person of the Trinity, Venerable Sheen said that the Father and the Son "...contemplate each other, love each other, unite in a love so powerful, so strong, and so perfect, that it forms between them a living bond. They give themselves in a love so infinite that...their love can express itself in nothing less than a Person, who is Love. Love at such a stage does

not speak...it expresses itself as we do in some ineffable moments, by that which indicates the very exhaustion of our giving – namely a sigh, or a breath. And that is why the Third Person of the Blessed Trinity is called the Holy Spirit or the Holy Ghost".

Venerable Sheen concluded his reflection by highlighting why God made the world, "God enjoyed the amiable society of His three Persons... [he] had no need ever to go outside of Himself in search of happiness...He made a world only because He *loved*."

And so, we too love and seek perfection in love. Heaven is where we encounter the fullness of love that quench the thirst of our hearts, satisfy the hunger of our minds for truth, because that is where we will find communion with perfect Life, perfect Truth and perfect Love in God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit.

"Father Knows Best" is the title of a 1950s family sitcom TV series. Appropriately, it is a comedy show, because fathers do not always know best. A lot of times, he knows not what he does not know!

It is hard being a father. We are never formally trained for the role and neither do they teach it at school. So we cannot always fully prepare for fatherhood. To make matters worse, neither are fathers ever in control of exactly when children arrive into their lives and that of their spouse. Until the baby arrives, there is an undetermined element of when conception happens, whether it will be a boy or a girl, and the exact timing of its birth. One day he is just a husband to a wife, the next day he is a father! Immediately, the pressure and the stress levels mount as expectations and responsibilities explode exponentially as the child grows and matures.

It is hard being a father. But...there is always a but! God never leaves us without help or example. And what better example to follow than St Joseph, the

earthly foster-father of our Lord Jesus. Few words are written about St Joseph but the silence speaks volumes. Firstly, he is a man who listens and responds to the will of God - he takes action and they speak louder than words. Secondly, the actions of St Joseph are always guided by what is just and done out of a self-giving love for others. He loved Mary more than himself; protected and provided for her even though he was poor. Thirdly, St Joseph was a man of courage. He did the right thing by Mary despite the risks to himself; and he uprooted his family to journey to a strange land in order to protect the infant Jesus. He did not walk away when the going got tough but faced his cross squarely, always trusting that God will provide if he responded to the promptings of the Spirit. Finally, if nothing else, St Joseph was humble. He never bragged about his visions, the special nature of his spouse and son. He kept these facts away from the public to guard his family and allow Jesus to mature and grow in stature quietly until the time is right for Jesus to reveal his Divinity. Indeed, St Joseph was blessed in his fatherhood to be able to cradle heaven in his arms and see God face to face in Jesus.



It is hard being a father. But it is also a blessing if we are ready to listen and respond to God. We will be blessed if we respond always with justice in our minds and selflessly in the bond of love. We will be blessed if we respond with courage even if it costs us personal loss; and even if the world laughs at us for not being "worldly wise". We will be blessed if we remain humble in our station in life whilst quietly serving and loving the family that God has blessed us with.

A Checklist for Catholic Dads - by Mr Randy Hain

In this article Mr Hain reflects on what were the actions that he learnt from his father and his own experiences as a parent. He said that just making this list was convicting and challenging for him as he became acutely aware of where he fell short. However, developing this list also inspired him as he tries to reflect on these actions during his prayer time each day.

So for all the fathers out there, we hope this list will also help you to reflect and strive on as you journey with your children, grandchildren and godchildren and shower them with the love that He has first showered on us.

1. Surrender. We have to surrender on an ongoing basis to Christ for his will to be done in our lives. St. Ignatius of Loyola once said: "Few souls understand what God would accomplish in them if they were to abandon themselves unreservedly to him and if they were to allow his grace to mould them accordingly."

2. Be a Man of Prayer. Our children will be much more likely to pray if we do. Work on developing a daily prayer routine with the goal of at least an hour a day devoted to prayer. Consider how much time we spend watching TV, answering emails or how much time we devote to exercise. We have more than enough time for prayer if we schedule it and integrate it into our day.

3. Understand our True Vocation. For those of us blessed to be married and have children, we must recognise that helping our families get to heaven and being good husbands and fathers - not our business careers - is our real vocation. Ask yourself: "Is my work serving my family? Or is my family serving my work?"

4. Invest Time. Our children need our time. Put down the smartphone; turn off the TV; cancel the golf outing. Let's spend more time with our kids! As author-theologian Scott Hahn wrote, in our modern age the father or mother who is willing to walk out of the office after forty hours in order to have more time with his/her family is the real hero.

5. Be Courageous. Christians are meant to stand out, not blend in. Blending in speaks to conforming so that our faith becomes part of the mainstream ... and we need to fight the culture. These are difficult times, and we have a responsibility to love and defend Christ, be great role models for our families and stand up for our faith.

6. Practice Detachment. Are we too focused on acquiring toys, bigger houses, nicer cars, or the next promotion? We need to let go of the things that are in the way of our prayer lives, Mass attendance, charitable giving, volunteering, time with our families, and certainly our relationship with Christ.

7. Love our Wives. Husbands, we must love and cherish our wives. Our children will learn to love others by how they see Mom and Dad love each other. We need to say, "I love you" to our wives and our children as often as possible. "The most important thing a father can do for his children is to love their mother." - Theodore Hesburgh
