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The Resurrection and the Life

5th Sunday of Lent
29 Mar 2020

Ez 37:12-14

Rom 8:8-11

Jn 11:1-45

In the thick of Lent, even as we fast and repent from our sins, Jesus points us towards Easter and definitively asserts his power over death. In this regard, three details illustrate why this Sunday's gospel carry so much hope for us.

First, Jesus reminds us: "I am the resurrection and the life. If anyone believes in me, even though he dies he will live, and whoever lives and believes in me will never die." (Jn 11:25-26) These are not mere words. Jesus backs up his declaration with a miracle that unequivocally proves what he just said.

This seems to be his exact intention. Although he received news early that Lazarus was ill, he deliberately waited two more days before going to Judaea. He reveals his motives: "This sickness will not end in death but in God's glory, and through it the Son of God will be glorified." He reiterates this later: "Lazarus is dead; and for your sake I am glad I was not there because now you will believe." (Jn 11:4, 14-15)

This explains why we see this verse so often at wakes and funerals. For us Christians, death is not definitive; it is only a prelude to the final victory. As Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI said at St Peter's Square in March 2008, "Bodily death is a sleep from which God can awake us at any moment."

This brings us to the second point: "as Pope Francis said in St Peter's Square in April 2014, Jesus' miracle

is too great, too clearly divine to be tolerated by the high priests, who, learning of the fact, decided to kill Jesus."

And yet, Jesus never shies away from this final straw. To glorify God, he approaches the tomb and orders Lazarus to come out. In so doing, he himself was put to death. How much more does our Resurrected Lord invite us to come out of our own tombs!

As Pope Francis said, "He invites us, almost orders us, to come out of the tomb in which our sins have buried us. He calls us insistently to come out of the darkness of that prison in which we are enclosed, content with a false and mediocre life... It is an invitation to let ourselves be freed from the 'bandages', from the bandages of pride."

But Jesus' clear divinity does not impede him from feeling sorrow — this is the third point. Seeing Mary and Martha, he too was in "great distress" and "wept". This is true "com-*passion*": Jesus is suffering with those who suffer because of death.

Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI thus said, "Christ's heart is divine-human: in him God and man meet perfectly, without separation and without confusion. He is the image, or rather, the incarnation of God who is love, mercy, and maternal tenderness, of God who is Life."

When we suffer too, when we mourn those who have passed, we can thus be sure that Jesus mourns and weeps together with us. And that compassion gives us hope that he will awaken those who have passed from this world and that they will share in his glory.

SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION



Organised annually by the Office for Young People (OYP) for youths and young working adults, six of our parishioners had the opportunity to attend it this year, and they will be sharing with us their testimonies in the weeks to come, so stay tuned to it! Here is our second testimony..



"Surrendering My Pain to Jesus"

Before coming to the School of Witness, I was contented with life. I didn't discern about coming to SOW or make any big sacrifices but was pressured by my older brother. So I signed up and told myself if I get in, I get in. Thus, I found myself on this 2-month journey, completely unprepared and with no expectations.

Growing up, I decided that the best way to live was to be independent and depend on no one emotionally. I didn't need anyone or anything because I knew what's best for me and I could trust only me. This was because when I was in primary 6, I was hurt and betrayed by my close friends. One day, they decided to stop talking to me without any explanation. Once, I was coincidentally walking behind them but they accused me of stalking them and being obsessed with them. This left a deep wound within me. This was compounded by the harsh words I received from my eldest brother and father growing up. To protect myself, I decided it was safest to keep my inner thoughts and feelings to myself, and rely on my strength alone. I was enough for me, and I didn't need God.

During the week on wholeness in SOW, I struggled badly. The sessions and

reflections dug up old and painful events in the past, and I really struggled to trust God and accept his love for me in those periods. I started to feel anger and despair at God as I felt that I had already reconciled these painful moments on my own but now God wanted me to relive the pain again. To cope with these hurts, I always chose to belittle my pain, telling myself that others had greater hurts than I. To be told to leave this mindset behind was difficult. Upon further reflection, I knew I had to face the truth that I needed healing from these hurts. However, I kept running away from God's love because I felt unworthy.

One day, I saw a vision of myself lying paralysed in fear. I felt like a lost cause, unable to open my heart to Jesus, unable to surrender control because of the walls I had put around my heart that I didn't know how to take down. I had unknowingly let these hurts affect my perception of God. One night however, as I lay on a bench, I saw a clear night sky full of stars. For me, it was a reminder of God's promise that even when I felt like I couldn't move, He meets me where I am. Truly, when I wanted to be quietly forgotten, Jesus demanded that I be seen. His relentless prodding finally pushed me to take the first step to Him when my cell group carried me to the cross during a paraliturgy. He spoke truths through them over me and broke

through my walls of unbelief to rely on him. I felt peace and hope, and that Jesus leaves none of his beloved behind to fend for themselves, including me. I realized that wholeness is not about being completely healed and free of pain, but in surrendering the pain to Jesus.

Now looking back, I see how God has always been faithful. The things I thought were achieved by me, were actually achieved by his strength in me. I have come to realise that he is my safe place where I can rest before I continue to take on the world! Jesus wants to do great things for all of us, but first we must allow him to. Despite the discomfort, I have learned to pray to surrender things that weigh my heart down. When in the past I thought it was useless to surrender, I now claim that every time I pray for surrender it gets easier to trust in him. I try to live excellently in bringing joy and love to those around me for His glory, and I continue to walk this journey with him. His promises remain unbroken, and as He has shown me my sky full of stars, I hope you can also start to see your own sky full of stars too!
