





"Christ Walks with us"

3rd Sunday of Easter 26 Apr 2020

Ac 2:14, 22-33 1 Pt 1:17-21 Lk 24:13-35

How did Easter feel this year? Was it one of joy and new hope? Or perhaps, given the current global situation, Easter 2020 was perhaps more muted, less celebratory, and not as meaningful. Indeed, the inability to physically receive Christ in the Eucharist, let alone our physical absence from the Easter liturgies might have already contributed to a diminished "mood". Given this, and the many worries we now have - our jobs, the economy, the safety of our loved ones, and our well-being - perhaps this Easter season more closely approximates Lent; Easter Joy overshadowed by temporal anxiety.

If this is how we feel, the readings this weekend are most apt. Like us, the disciples in today's gospel have yet to experience the Easter Joy despite Christ's resurrection. Having lost their Lord and Master and now being "wanted men" themselves, they have not only had their beliefs severely challenged but are now persecuted for them. They still live in fear and find themselves plagued with many concerns, not least their own well-being and safety.

They thus decide to leave this chapter of their life behind and flee Jerusalem, unaware that Christ was very much in their midst, walking with them along the way. Ostensibly dejected, they have yet to comprehend what has taken place, despite being cognisant of the events that have transpired.



his resurrection mean if we still experience existential hardships?

To these questions, Christ reminds us that suffering, and hardships are necessary for one to enter into Glory (Lk 24:26). Indeed, Christ's victory over death whilst removing the sting of death and sin (cf CCC 402; 1 Cor 15:55), should not be misconstrued as the magic bullet which would liberate us from hardship or bring prosperity to our lives - God is not a "magician with magic wand." (Pope Francis, Pontifical Academy of Sciences 2014) Importantly Christ's presence with his "suffering" disciples en route to Emmaus reminds us that he continues to walk with us in times of trouble and despair.

Do hardships thus lead us to recognise Christ walking with us or do they cause us to forget his presence? (St John Paul II, Salvifici Doloris) Emmaus reminds us that we must not allow temporal worries to cause us to lose sight of the spiritual realities in which we dwell. Namely that Christ has won the ultimate battle over sin and death through his passion, death and resurrection and he continues to walk with us in our own daily passions, adjoining our temporal crosses with his own (Pope Francis, Extraordinary Urbi et Orbi, March 2020).

"By his passion and death on the cross Christ has given a new meaning to suffering: it can henceforth configure us to him and unite us with his redemptive passion." (CCC 1505; 1502) Mindful of this, let us not be like the disciples at Emmaus who at first failed to recognise Christ's presence in our despair. Instead let us remember that our hardships are a "participation in the saving work of Jesus" (CCC 1521), and rejoyce that His resurrection -his victory over death - means that he continues to walk with us always.

"Listening to God's Voice"

Before attending the School of Witness (SOW), I harboured self-hatred and felt emptiness and loneliness. This began when I was separated from my close friends, having to go to Junior College alone. I felt abandoned and feared missing out. A friend who I treasured also left me and I felt unwanted. Not being able to do anything about it caused me to build walls around my heart. I tried praying but my prayers didn't seem to be answered. I was angry and frustrated at God and felt like he too had abandoned me. I lost all motivation to do anything with my life and it felt like I was just going through the motions every day with no purpose or goal.

To distract myself, I ensured that I was always there for my friends. I started to brush off all my emotions and hurts, telling myself, "Your issues are nothing compared to whatever they are facing, just keep it to yourself, don't be a burden". I started drinking frequently and engaging in other activities that drew me further from God. Nearing my A level period, I stopped going for mass regularly. However, after much reflection, I realized that God still reached out to me through the friends I knew in church. They would ask me how I was doing, reminding me that they were praying for me and that I wasn't alone. A few of them also encouraged me to sign up for SOW.

Thinking back, I'm honestly not sure why I signed up. At that point, God felt distant and my relationship with God was unstable. All I knew was that I desired to have Him in my life. The first week of SOW was a struggle as my heart was still closed. During the para-liturgy on coming home, I couldn't feel God and convinced myself that God didn't care. I approached a prayer team member who asked me in prayer, "Are you waiting for validation from the Lord that you are meant to be

here?" Those words hit me and it dawned on me that there were many reasons to not come for SOW, but the fact that I was there meant that HE wanted me there. I felt the outer layer of the wall around my heart being removed and I was reassured that I truly belonged there.



He showed me that I am loved and that I am good. I realized that all along I had been relying on my own strength, that I couldn't see the little things that God had done in my life.



The following days, I tried my best to be open but somehow, that inner wall was still there. In a conversation, I was reminded that I was like a baby, learning to listen to God's voice again since I had been listening to so many negative voices that I couldn't distinguish which was His.

> During the charism session, my heart beat really hard as we prayed. I felt this immense joy from the simple act of praying for others. It felt like God had finally broken down the walls surrounding my heart. He showed me that I am loved and that I am good. I realized that all along I had been relying on my own strength, that I couldn't see the little things that God had done in my life. The whole time, I thought that God was away from me but in reality, I was away from him. He had always been working and pursuing me. He also

showed me that in my emptiness and loneliness, He was holding me and crying with me as I cried.

Even though I may still be doubtful and hesitant at times, I know that He is always present, waiting for me to turn to Him whenever I'm ready. I continue to pray that I will grow deeper in love with Christ, and to one day not only believe that He is here for me but to proclaim with conviction that He will save me from the darkness in my life. I am hopeful and expectant that even though I have not fully encountered the Lord, I remain open that He will continue to reveal His love and plans for me.
