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
Origin of Sin

12th Sunday in Ordinary Time
21 June 2020

Jer 20:10-13
Rm 5:12-15
Mt 10:26-33

Packed in four short verses of the second reading today, St Paul reveals the origin of humanity's sinfulness, its effects and the cure. The first man, Adam, tempted by the devil, allowed his wife and himself to disobey God's command by eating from the "tree of the knowledge of good and evil" (Gen 2:17). Adam abused his God-given freedom to spurn God in an attempt to "be like God", but "without God, before God, and not in accordance with God." (CCC 398) As a consequence, Adam and Eve immediately lost the grace of original holiness and shattered the harmony of creation. Explicitly foretold by God (Gen 2:17), the tragic consequence of this first sin is that death became a reality in human history (See CCC 396-400).

From Adam and Eve, God made "every nation of men to live on all the face of the earth" (Ac 17:26) and therefore the human race forms a unity (CCC 360). By this "unity of the human race", all men are implicated in Adam's sin, in the same way as all are implicated in Christ's justice (CCC 404). Whilst Adam and Eve committed a personal sin which wounded their human nature, by propagation they transmitted this "fallen state" to all mankind. In other words, the human nature that we inherited, very much like the DNA we get from our parents, is deprived of original holiness and justice. Therefore, properly understood, the "original sin" that we all carry is a state of being rather than an act committed (CCC 404). But the consequence is still the same - left to our fallen state, we will die

both bodily and spiritually.

Thankfully, God our loving Father, never abandoned us in our fallen state. Throughout salvation history, God calls out to us (Gen 3:9) and heralds the coming victory over evil and the restoration of our fallen human nature through the Messiah and Redeemer who is Jesus Christ (CCC 410). St Paul alludes to Jesus the Messiah as the "New Adam", when he said that "Adam prefigures the One [who is] to come." (Rom 5:14) God the Father sent his own Son, Jesus, "in the form of a slave, in the form of a fallen humanity, on account of sin" and "made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God." (2 Cor 5:21, CCC 602). Unlike Adam who disobeyed, Jesus the "New Adam" was "obedient [to God] unto death" (Phil 2:8). Though Jesus had no sin in him and therefore was exempt from death, "he himself bore our sins in his body on the tree" (1 Pt 2:24), accepting his voluntary death in order to redeem our fallen humanity. And now, although our sins are many, the redemptive effects of Jesus' sacrifice

on the cross is freely available to all mankind - anyone who "believes (in Jesus) and is baptised, will be saved." (Mk 16:16)

So why did God not prevent the first man from sinning which unleashed so much evil and suffering in the world today? We might be familiar with the saying that if one truly loves another, one should set them free. In a similar way, God in his utter love, chose to create man with free will - a freedom to choose to love and trust God or not to; a freedom to obey God or not to; a freedom to do good or to do evil. And Man can only be truly happy and complete, when he freely chooses to love God, his Creator, and his fellow man. When we recognise this profound relation of man to God, we begin to understand what sin is and why we so desperately need the grace of Jesus Christ to overcome sin, be redeemed and return to our original state of holiness and justice (see CCC 310, 386, 387, 407-409, 602).

Perfect models of CATHOLIC FATHERHOOD




This Sunday we honour all those who are living out the beautiful vocation of fatherhood. Not just our fathers but people who act in the role of a father who have touched all of our lives - our godfathers, grandfathers, uncles. Let us look at how some of our saintly fathers have lived out this vocation and what we may learn from them.

Perhaps the greatest model of all would be **St Joseph**, the man chosen by God to be head of the Holy Family. He was a faithful husband to Mary and a devoted foster father to Jesus Christ. Sacred scripture portrays him as a quiet, unassuming man who listened closely to God and always followed his will.



St Joseph was described as a "righteous man" in St Matthew's gospel (Mt 1:19). We also hear of his obedience because he and Mary took the infant Jesus to the temple for consecration in accordance with the Mosaic law (Lk 2:22-24).

St Joseph's chastity and industriousness also makes him the perfect model of Catholic fatherhood. He knew the value of a hard day's work and also understood the challenges of providing for a family. Many modern fathers today who may be struggling in their multi-faceted roles today could do well to look towards St Joseph and ask for this saint's intercession.



St Louis Martin, father of St Thérèse of Lisieux, supported five of his daughters in their vocations. What this saint taught his daughters was "if God is calling you, respond to God." His generosity with which he gave his girls to God showed incredible faith in action.

As a hypersensitive child, St Thérèse often had tantrums

but her father was always patient with her. She learnt that he loved her and never held her tantrums against her. This example became a model of the unconditional love of God for her as she grew out of this phase and into a deep personal faith.




St Louis IX was more than just the king of France — he was also the father of eleven children! St. Louis took his responsibilities as a monarch seriously, and he saw his kingship as an opportunity to serve God. Throughout his reign,

he was an authentically Christian witness to both his own children and the people of France. In a letter he wrote to his eldest son, filled with advice and lessons on faith, he highlighted traits like gratitude to God; frequent confession; tenderness of heart for family and the poor; and devotion to the Church and respect for the pope.

Two saints who were not biological fathers but are still good models to emulate were **St Benedict of Norcia** and **St Francis de Sales**. St Benedict is known as the Father of Western Monasticism and wrote

"The Rule" - a simple set of guidelines for how the life of a monk should be lived. St Benedict talks about being gentle yet not neglecting discipline, correcting 'children' with love, and guiding them with a gentleness, kindness and humility we're supposed to have as fathers: to not lord it over our children, and to really model the holiness that we desire them to have.



Saint Francis de Sales was a Bishop of Geneva and became noted for his deep faith, fatherly presence and his gentle approach to the religious divisions in his land resulting from the Protestant Reformation.

These saints and so many more struggled in ways to live their lives faithfully and to communicate the eternal truth of the gospel. We pray that all fathers will learn from them and ask for the saints' intercession to live out their fatherly vocations so that they may be the loving, compassionate and Christ-centered fathers they have been called to be.
