Excuse me. Forgive me.

24th Sunday in Ordinary Time 13 Sep 2020

Sir 27:30--28:7 Rom 14:7-9 Mt 18:21-35

As disciples trying our best to follow Jesus, we can find ourselves struggling with the difficult duty to forgive and love those who have hurt us. Perhaps to prevent abuse and unrepentance, the lewish rabbis in those days recommended forgiveness that be extended not more than three times. Peter thought he was being generous to suggest that one forgives seven times (two times of three and one more added for good measure). However, Jesus gives an ambiguous reply which, in the original text, could mean either 77 times or 70 times seven (490 times).

There are two ways we can go about interpreting today's gospel. On one hand, we might take Jesus' commands literally and keep a scoresheet to make sure others do not wrong us more than 490 times. We might also use the king's response to justify our anger and efforts to bring retribution to the perpetrator. This interpretation focuses on a just God. On the other hand, we can take Jesus' words to the other extreme. Perhaps out of fear of God's judgement on us, we might allow others to take advantage of us or abuse us even when they have proven themselves untrustworthy. This interpretation emphasises a merciful God.

If God is both just and merciful, does he contradict himself?

The parable has an eschatological aspect in its message. It assures us that God is truly just and that justice will ultimately be served at the end of time. We are reminded that it is



God who has the power and right to judge. In light of our last day which is unknown to us, the First Reading encourages us to "stop hating...and live by the commandments" (Sir 28:6). It also says that it is the sinner who "cherishes resentment" (Sir 27:30).

Is it then a sin to be angry? Anger is a right and natural response to witnessing an injustice. But it does not have to be destructive. Forgiveness is the determination to let go of our human compulsion for revenge. It can also mean releasing and channeling the anger towards creative and empowered acts of change overcome systemic injustice. A resolution that is committed to restorative justice seeks the good of all including the conversion of the wrongdoer. This also means, in the case of abuse, the victim is obligated to take themselves out of the situation so that the wrongdoer cannot continue in his abusive ways. Thus, God's commandment to offer love and mercy is not exploited; evil is not permitted.

In CS Lewis' essay On Forgiveness, he distinguishes between forgiving and excusing. When we pray to God asking for forgiveness, many times we are giving a great many reasons to convince God that it is really not our fault at all. Lewis says, "real forgiveness means looking steadily at the sin, the sin that is left over without any excuse, after all allowances have been made, and seeing it in all its horror, dirt, meanness, and malice, nevertheless being wholly reconciled to the man who has done it."

There is a stark difference when others ask us for forgiveness; we do not accept their excuses as easily. This is where Jesus' reply to forgive seventy seven times apply. Indeed he was indicating that it is impractical to keep a scoresheet and so, impractical to weigh excuses. Furthermore, in 1 Cor 13, St Paul writes: "love does not keep a record of wrongdoings" (1 Cor 13:5). We must learn to imitate God who is, as we sing in the psalm, "slow to anger, and rich in mercy" (Ps 103:8). Indeed, "to be a Christian means to forgive the inexcusable, because God has forgiven the inexcusable in you" (On Forgiveness, C.S. Lewis).

"Nothing of what a repentant sinner places before God's mercy can be excluded from the embrace of his forgiveness. For this reason, none of us has the right to make forgiveness conditional" (Misericordiae et Misera, Pope Francis). For God to see all the wrongs we have done and decide not to cut us off is truly a gift. We must extend this same gift we have received to others, so that our communion is not an artificial one. To be united to the Father is to be united to the rest of his children.




HOW CAN WE PRAY FOR YOU?

2. Do make your online booking one day in advance.

- 3. There will be no booking on Public Holidays and Sundays. The visiting period is from Mon to Sat: 10am 12 noon, 2pm 4pm.
- 4. **A maximum of 5 people are allowed per slot.** All visitors are required to wear a mask, check in with SafeEntry for contact tracing and register at the Parish Office for temperature screening.
- 5. Each visit is for a duration of **20 minutes** (e.g Enter at 10am and exit by 10.20am, next available timeslot will be from 10.30am 10.50am, etc. If visitors are late for their booked time, no additional time can be accorded).
- 6. If the group is early, please wait either at the bench in front of JPII Hall or seats located outside the Parish Office. Please be mindful to keep a one-metre distance apart from other groups.

Confirmed and Sent Forth

Over three Masses on Sat 5 Sep, 25 teens were given the Sacrament of Confirmation and told that they now had a "mission" to perform. Fr Ben challenged the teens to use their God-given "talents" for the church and God and not bury them, like in the parable of the servant who was given five talents in Matt 25:14-30.

Due to the new rules on numbers attending Masses and social distancing, each Mass could only accommodate 9 teens with their 4 guests. Though it was different from the large Confirmation Masses that had hitherto been the norm, the smaller group size did not take away the essence of the Sacrament and the fact that the Sacraments Are a Really Big Deal for all of us.

"It is particularly important for us to teach children that Sacraments are so much more than a ceremony to prepare for; they are God's way of reaching down to us and offering us a lifelong gift - a gift of grace that gives us a glimpse of heaven and a taste of eternity," writes Elizabeth Kelly, an award-winning speaker and the author of six books, including "Reasons I Love Being Catholic".

Let us continue to keep our youths in prayer as they cope with their studies at this stage in their lives and to use the gifts of the Holy Spirit that has been poured onto them.
