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Mission Requires an Interior Life

29th Sunday in Ordinary Time 18 Oct 2020

ls 45:1, 4-6 1 Th 1:1-5b Mt 22:15-21

In the opening scene of today's Gospel, we find the Pharisees plotting a trap against Jesus on the politicallysensitive topic about taxes. They falsely flatter him by addressing him as "Master", and "affirming" him as a true speaker and teacher of the way of God (Mt 22:16). Bible scholars have seen the Pharisees' tactic as a challenge to Jesus' rabbinic authority – for they believed that they alone were the authoritative interpreters of Jewish law.

By directing attention to Jesus' authority to interpret God's law, the Pharisees hoped to accomplish two goals. First, they wanted to force Jesus to give an answer; if Jesus refused to answer them, he could lose his credibility as a Rabbi with the very people who had just proclaimed him King (cf Mt 21:9). Secondly, as our Holy Father pointed out, with regards to the question of paying taxes to Caesar – a foreign occupier of Jewish land, "depending on how [Jesus] responded, he could have been accused of being either for or against Rome." (Angelus, 22 Oct 2017)

Whenever we read the Gospels, we tend to have a portrait of Jesus being aloof from governmental concerns, and whose teachings seem to point to an apolitical life for his disciples. But such a picture of Jesus is not accurate. While Jesus was sending his disciples out for mission, Jesus warned his disciples that he was sending them like sheep in the midst of wolves; so they had to be shrewd as serpents

and simple as doves (cf Mt 10:16). As the Church celebrates World Mission Sunday today, we are reminded of our missionary call to go out into the world to proclaim the Good News. In embracing Christ's mission, we are also reminded that being sent forth could mean persecution, suffering, and even death threats in areas hostile to Christianity.

Many of us also have a perception that mission is related mainly humanitarian work for its to own sake, but as highlighted in Apostolicam Actuositatem, Decree on the Apostolate of the Laity, "The mission of the Church is... to penetrate and perfect the temporal order with the spirit of the Gospel." (AA 5) The temporal order constitutes, "the good things of life and the prosperity of the family, culture, economic matters, the arts and professions, the laws of the political community, international relations, and other matters of this kind, as well as their development and progress...[these] aid in the attainment of man's ultimate goal but also possess their own intrinsic value." (AA 7). St Josemaria Escriva, Founder of the Opus Dei, puts it succinctly, "...God is calling you to serve Him in and from the ordinary, material and secular activities of human life. He waits for us every day, in the laboratory, in the operating theatre, in the army barracks, in the



university chair, in the factory, in the workshop, in the fields, in the home and in all the immense panorama of work. Understand this well: there is something holy, something divine, hidden in the most ordinary situations, and it is up to each one of you to discover it." (*Passionately Loving the World*, No. 114)

However, we can only be effective missionaries in the world when we have an interior life and disposition rooted in Christ through prayer. As illustrated in the malicious situation that Jesus faced with the Pharisees, it was being in the Father himself, his "secret source" (CCC 2599), that Jesus, in great wisdom and authority, answered the Pharisees, "Give to Caesar what belongs to Caesar – and to God what belongs to God." (Mt 22:21)

Christ reminded us that without him, we can do nothing (Jn 15:5). In his World Mission Sunday message, our Holy Father reminds us again of this truth, "The mission ... is not a programme, an enterprise to be carried out by sheer force of will. It is Christ who makes the Church go out of herself. In the mission of evangelization, you move because the Holy Spirit pushes you, and carries you."

World Mission Sunday

World Mission Sunday, which seeks to heighten awareness of the missions, as well as to collect funds for them, is an important date in the life of the Church, because it teaches how to give: as an offering made to God, in the Eucharistic celebration and for all the missions of the world.

The Church is by her nature missionary and is commanded by Christ to preach the gospel to all men. In his last words to the apostles, Christ's mission for them was to, "Go, therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you" (Mt 28:19-20).

The responsibility for fulfilling that mandate passed on unchanged from the apostles to the bishops and to all Catholics of today. All Catholics, by virtue of their baptism, have the responsibility of participating, sharing and cooperating in Christ's ongoing mission to spread the Gospel "to the nations" (CCC 849).

Pope Francis' message for this year's celebration was based on the theme taken from the Book of Isaiah, "Here am I, send me". In his message, he says that the Covid-19 pandemic is an opportunity for mission and service to others. He concluded in his message that World Mission Sunday will be a day on which we will be able to reaffirm - through prayer, reflection and material help - our active participation in Jesus' mission in his Church.

So let us come together to pray, give and do our part for missionaries using the **World Mission Rosary**, inaugurated by Archbishop Fulton J. Sheen in Feb 1951.

"We must pray, and not for ourselves, but for the world. To this end, I have designed the World Mission Rosary. Each of the five decades is of a different colour to represent each of the five continents."

Pray the World Mission Rosary

Praying this Rosary, Archbishop Sheen said, would "aid the Holy Father and his Society for the Propagation of the Faith by supplying him with practical support, as well as prayers, for the poor mission territories of the world." Each decade of that World Mission Rosary calls to mind an area where the Church continues her evangelising mission: GREEN for the forests and grasslands of AFRICA; BLUE for the ocean surrounding the ISLANDS OF THE PACIFIC; WHITE symbolising EUROPE, the seat of the Holy Father, shepherd of the world; RED calling to mind the fire of faith that brought missionaries to the AMERICAS, and YELLOW, the morning light of the East, for ASIA.


