Rising with Christ

Easter Sunday of the Lord's Resurrection

4 Apr 2021

Ac 10:34a, 37-43 Col 3:1-4 Jn 20:1-9

Surrexit Christus! Alleluia Alleluia! Today Christ is risen from the grave! Today he has conquered sin! Today he has triumphed over death! (cf Easter Sequence) Let us celebrate therefore with great joy, remembering that his resurrection opens the door for us to Heaven and breathes forth the eternal waters of salvation — flowing through his Church born by the piercing of his side at the cross; his Church invigorated by his triumph over death! (cf Rite of Blessing of Baptismal Water)

This Easter joy we experience is born from the *newness* of Christ's triumphal resurrection, a newness we, as Easter people, share with him. The crosses we bore with Christ during our Lenten sacrifices are now triumphal symbols of our salvation, certain proof that death has no hold over the Church of Christ - "death where is your sting?" (1 Cor 15:55)

Being Easter people, we joyfully anticipate and eagerly journey towards the day when we will truly rise with Christ to eternal life. If we desire to rise like him on the last day, it behoves us to consider how eternal life must be lived out daily now, and not merely as a phenomenon after our physical death. For to triumphantly rise with Christ we must die to our old selves each day, that we may be free from sin which holds us down in the grave; free to be born afresh through Christ, and with Christ. (St Basil the Great, De Spiritu Sancto, 15:35)

Our daily crosses must be the gibbet on which we nail our sins; becoming salvific ladders to newness of life in Christ. Should we continue to hold on to our old ways, we will never truly rise but be weighed down by our sins in a grave of our own making; our gaze firmly fixed upon earthly things, instead of "things that are in heaven" (Col 3: 1-4).

To triumph in these purgative practices and other daily mortifications, we need to look to Jesus "the pioneer and perfecter of our faith" (Heb 12: 1-13) who lived perfectly a life of Faith, Hope and Love.

Christ carried his cross for our sins, he died for us that we may live! In return, he asks us to carry our crosses and follow him: to die to ourselves that we might rise with him. <u>Faith</u> *illumines* this ascent for without faith in the resurrection, without faith in his Church, and without faith in things invisible, we will only cleave to things visible in this world. Faith on our ascent of the cross is thus the light of sight: sight of the path that Christ took before us, sight of Christ who continues to make the ascent with us, and sight of things to come. (Pope Francis, Lumen Fidei 29-30)

<u>Hope</u> is the *belief in the sight* which faith provides: to believe that we

were born to be with God in eternity and to believe that on the last day we too can rise like Jesus. Hope therefore invigorates our assent, for without Hope our struggles, the crosses we carry, and the desire to die to ourselves for Christ would be for naught. Hope on our ascent of the cross is thus "faith disposed towards the future, making all the difference in the present" (Fr Richard Neuhaus, "Saved in Hope"); knowledge that our end is eternity with Christ, not the tomb of this world. (Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI, Spe Salvi 12)

Finally, Love, the very reason we celebrate Easter - the reason behind Christ's passion and resurrection (Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI, Deus Caritas Est 6) must be the primary motivating force behind our desire to ascent to the cross to rise with Christ. God, for love of us "died from what was ours, that we will live from what is his" (St Augustine, Sermon 30). To Love God therefore is to desire to be with him for eternity, to follow him, to be crucified with him, and to rise with him to eternal life. May we always live out this Easter life that we may rise to newness of life with Christ and see him face to face at the end of time.


CATHOLIC WELFARE SERVICES (CWS): EMMANUEL SECOND CHANCE EDUCATION (ESCE) PROGRAMME


MARRIAGE ENCOUNTER: MAKE YOUR MARRIAGE A PRIORITY!

Eastertide: The 50 Days of Easter

For most people, Easter is only one weekend in the year that begins with Good Friday and ends with Easter Sunday; or for more secular people, it is a long weekend to enjoy to the fullest - since many countries declare Good Friday and Easter Monday as public holidays.

Unfortunately, what many do not understand (even some Catholics) is that Easter is not just one day or one weekend, it is actually a whole season. In fact, Eastertide or Paschal time as it is also known, lasts a full 50 days, from Easter Sunday till Pentecost. This makes it the longest liturgical season in the liturgical year, longer than both Christmas or Lent.



Why is this not common knowledge?

Part of the reason is that Easter does not have the same commercial appeal that Christmas has, for example. However, it is also important to understand that Eastertide is not an open invitation to party on for 50 days straight. Instead, we should consider the Easter season as an invitation to explore more deeply and celebrate our relationship with God, and his presence in the world. To reflect on what was a crucial period of time for the early days of the Church, which defined early Christianity's existence.

The Tradition behind Eastertide

In Christianity, the 50 days which pass between Easter Sunday and Pentecost are symbolic of the days that passed between Christ's Resurrection and Pentecost, which commemorates the day of the coming of the Holy Spirit on the early followers of Christ. This moment was instrumental in cementing Christianity's place in history.

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What can I do to connect more closely with God during this time?

Attending Church throughout this time is important. One way the Church welcomes this period, and reflects more deeply on it, is through reading the Acts of the Apostles at Masses all through Eastertide. These readings of course tell the story of the Church's earliest days, and the struggles and strife as it persevered in spreading the faith throughout the ancient world. We celebrate the stories of heroism, contention, miracles and persecution as a testament to the presence of a Risen Christ in the world, and the actions of the Holy Spirit, operating through the lives of his disciples.

Eastertide should be considered a time of hope, a time as was then where war and violence were all too commonplace, and yet God as he demonstrated then has not abandoned us. So, let us continue to find hope and encouragement through faith!




Jesus Is Alive!
