# **Be Opened**

23<sup>rd</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time 5 September 2021

Is 35:4-7a Jm 2:1-5 Mk7:31-37

Our senses are the medium through which we connect to the world around us. Helen Keller was a famed American author and disability rights advocate who became blind and deaf after an illness struck her at nineteen months old. Imagine losing not one but two primary senses. In her autobiography, The Story of My Life, Keller described her initial frustrations of not comprehending what her teacher Anne Sullivan was trying to convey through the feeling of her hand gestures. She learnt how to copy the gestures but could not grasp that every object had a unique word to identify it.

Keller recalled the moment she finally understood: "I stood still, my whole attention fixed upon the motions of her fingers. Suddenly I felt a misty consciousness as of something forgotten — a thrill of returning thought; and somehow the mystery of language was revealed to me. I knew then that 'w-a-t-e-r' meant the wonderful cool something that was flowing over my hand. The living word awakened my soul, gave it light, hope, set it free!"

This must have been the same amazement that filled the man whom Jesus healed in today's Gospel. Jesus chose to minister in a very tangible way — through spittle and physically touching the man's ears and tongue. It was a form of communication that the man could understand and therefore accept the healing offered to him. Jesus also spoke the word "Ephphatha", which means "be opened". While previously the man

had been closed and isolated, now he is able to open up to the world and people around him.

Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI says that this opening of hearing and speech also "involved his whole self and his life...There is an inner closure that affects the person's inmost self, which the Bible calls the heart. It is this that Jesus came to open, to liberate, so as to enable us to live to the full our relationship with God and with others." (Angelus, 9 Sep 2012) This is the reason that the Word was made flesh, that we who are "rendered inwardly deaf and mute by sin" might hear the voice of Love through Jesus who speaks to our heart, and in turn learn this language of love to speak it back to God and to others.


This opening of senses and establishment of relationship with God is celebrated in the Ephphatha Rite which is part of the Rite of Baptism. The words of the rite reads: "The Lord Jesus made the deaf hear and the dumb speak. May He soon touch your ear to receive His word and your mouth to proclaim His Faith." The priest also touches the ears and lips of the elect, blessing their natural capacities that it may lead them to a supernatural growth in faith.

Our senses are gifts, but as the Second Reading warns, they could also be misused. St James instructs us to "show no partiality" when it comes to status and outward appearances. If our treatment of others depends on how luxuriously they dress or how eloquently they speak, we become "judges with evil designs." A genuinely open heart is able to look beyond appearances to welcome all - rich or poor, great or small.

Pope Francis emphasised that Jesus heals us from the "fear that impels

us to marginalise the sick, the suffering, the disabled...Too often the sick and the suffering become a problem, while they should be an occasion to show a society's concern and solidarity with regard to the weakest." (Angelus, 9 Sep 2018) Indeed, a genuinely open heart will also give preference to those who suffer.

Through our healed senses, may we learn to recognise God especially in the poor, the sick and the marginalised; and may we advocate for them whenever they are ignored or silenced. We give our gifts of sight, listening, and speech to the Body of Christ when we hold ourselves in solidarity with the weakest. As Helen Keller says: "I believe that God is in me as the sun is in the colour and fragrance of the flower, the Light in my darkness, the Voice in my silence."



# 10 Ways Our Lady of Sorrows can help ease our troubles this September



September is the month dedicated to Our Lady of Sorrows. This September is an especially fitting time for us to find strength in this devotion, as we adjust to challenges with work and school, societal upheaval, and an unusually tempestuous weather cycle. Our masked world can feel surreal, as we stay at least six feet apart from our neighbor. Our Lady offers us the best possible consolation.

Immediately following August's devotion to the Immaculate Heart, and preceding October's devotion to Our Lady of the Rosary, September is an ideal time to strengthen our connection to Mary. So what better moment is there to immerse ourselves in her sorrows? The love and compassion we feel as we meditate upon her sorrows allows us to forget or transcend our own for a time. Further, we are reminded that our Mother truly understands us.

In the words of Pope St. John Paul II, "Turn your eyes incessantly to the Blessed Virgin; she, who is the Mother of Sorrows and also the Mother of Consolation, can understand you completely and help you. Looking to her, praying to her, your tedium will become serenity, your anguish change into hope, and your grief into love." This month, let's unite our sorrows to Mary's. Before we know it, we'll actually be more joyful! Here are some ways to do just that:



## TRANSFORM PAIN INTO PURPOSE

Take the sufferings you endure and offer them up for the reparation of Mary's Immaculate Heart.

Drawing upon your own sorrows will prevent a lukewarm heart, and let you instead be on fire with devotion and love as you contemplate the sorrows of our Mother and offer up sacrifices and acts of reparation, such as the First Saturday Devotion. Taking pain and transforming it into purpose through these acts is healing for the mind and heart.

## **CULTIVATE JOY**

In this month of Mary's Sorrows, dwell less on your own sorrows, and cultivate joy just by thinking of the wonderful Blessed Mother we have! Feeling low? Say a Hail Mary on the spot. Another idea is to journal your sorrows and then write a prayer asking Mary to help you to heal them.

#### EASE SOMEONE'S SUFFERING

Offer to carry someone's cross for a bit, like Simon of Cyrene. You can do this by sending a card, closely listening when someone wants to talk about a worry; a grief; a pain; or a loneliness and offering time and empathy instead of being "too busy" to be there for them. You could send a bouquet to someone who is having a hard time: maybe roses or lilies in honor of Our Lady! Cook someone a meal that tastes so good they forget their troubles! Try "comfort food" like pasta, chicken soup with biscuits, or a brunch of pancakes and eggs.



# PRAY THE SEVEN SORROWS ROSARY OR SEVEN SORROWS DEVOTION

The Seven Sorrows devotion involves praying seven Hail Marys a day, each one while meditating on one of Our Lady's seven sorrows.

## PARTNER WITH SOMEONE IN PRAYER

Pray daily for someone you know who is suffering, and let them know you will partner with them in prayer so that the person feels less alone. This is a great month to pray this Prayer for the Feast of Our Lady of Sorrows: "O God, in Whose Passion a sword of sorrow pierced the most dear soul of the glorious Virgin-Mother, Mary, as foretold by Simeon, mercifully grant that we who reverently commemorate Her sorrows, may obtain the blessed effect of Thy Passion. Who livest and reignest, in the unity of the Holy Ghost, God, world without end. Amen."
