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# Serving to Greatness

25<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time 19 September 2021

Wis 2:12, 17-20 Jm 3:16 - 4:3 Mk 9:30-37

For the second time in Mark's gospel, lesus tells his disciples that he will be handed over to man to suffer death and after three days rise again. Once again the disciples, including Peter who only recently declared that Jesus is the Messiah (Mk 8:29), have great difficulty comprehending such a shocking teaching. Having just witnessed great power in the Transfiguration of Jesus (Mk 9:2-8) and the curing of the possessed mute boy (Mk 9:16-29), it seems inconceivable that Jesus can simply be handed over to man and be killed. And they were afraid to ask (Mk 9:32).

Of all the possible unasked questions, perhaps the biggest would be "Why?" - Why do you have to suffer and die? Couldn't you just say a word and save us that way? Why do we also have to "take up (our) cross" (Mk 8:34) and suffer? Why do we have to lose our life in order to save it? Why does evil always seem to win whilst the righteous suffer? These unasked questions in one form or another, echo through the ages seeking answers that only a soul docile to the promptings of the Holy Spirit can hear.

God is love (1 Jn 4:8). And when Adam spurned Love by sinning against the Author of love, he caused a rupture in our relationship with God that no man can repair. But God continues to love us despite our betrayal, and out of this love he sent his beloved Son into his creation with an expressed mission to die in our place

for the sins against God that we have committed, so that the rupture can be healed. Such is the love of God the complete giving of himself to us, for us and to show us that true love means sacrifice even to the point of suffering a tortuous death on the cross. Love is the reason that Jesus had to suffer and die on the cross.

Suffering in itself can sometimes difficult to comprehend. Voluntarily suffering for the love of God and neighbour is even harder to comprehend and goes against worldly reasoning. The way the godless world thinks is deceptively simple - we only have one life; it ends when we die and there is no coming back; therefore, disregard the old, poor and weak to take pleasure where we can (see Wis 2:1-11). To the world, suffering is anathema; power and might are to be used to gain influence, wealth, prestige and dominance over others and most of all, to avoid suffering. Jesus turns this thinking on its head via his suffering on the Cross, showing that true grandeur is achieved by putting oneself last in importance and expressing this by becoming a servant to even the lowliest of persons - "If anyone wants to be first, he must make himself least of all and servant of all." (Mk 9:35)

Using the disciples' argument about who will be the greatest amongst

them as a teaching moment, Jesus drove home the point by putting his arms around a child saying "Anyone who welcomes one of these little children in my name, welcomes me..." (Mk 9:37) In both Aramaic and Greek, the word for child can also mean servant which has the lowest social status. So, to welcome a little child is to accept, love and care for someone who needs it and who cannot possibly repay the kindness. Jesus identifies himself with the needy and those who are insignificant in the eyes of the world (cf Mt 25:34-40). Therefore, Jesus himself is mysteriously present whenever we welcome someone who is lowly, poor or sick.

The Cross was the reason Jesus came. But Jesus never speaks about his suffering and death on the cross without speaking about his resurrection. The cross is now the hallmark of being a Christian to humbly serve and love God and neighbour with self-sacrificial love; following the footsteps of Christ in the way of the Cross. And when we have endured to the end, what awaits us is the sure hope of resurrection and eternal joy with our Maker.

May God grace us with humility and meekness to love and serve all whom he sends to us.
