Disciples *Making Disciples*

Who is My Enemy?

7th Sunday in Ordinary Time 20 Feb 2022

1 Sam 26:2, 7-9,12-13, 22-23 1 Cor 15:45-49 Lk 6:27-38

The gospel today teaches us how to treat our enemies. Just as we ask ourselves "who is our neighbour?", it is equally important to ask "who is our enemy?" The word "enemy" comes from the Latin *"inimicus"*, which means "not a friend". We often contrast the hatred we feel towards our enemies with the affection for our friends. Friendships arise because of a common understanding, sharing mutual goodwill for each other. But that does not make anyone who is not our friend an enemy.

Perhaps we can consider an enemy as someone who has deep convictions in opposing views from us. Conflicts with them can bring about some really intense reactions—frustrations, anger, desire for destruction or revenge etc. Yet, Jesus says it is possible, even necessary, to love them just as they are. Our interactions with our enemies may involve debating over a contentious issue, out of a motivation to correct them and lead them to the truth. Inadvertently it may result in our own aggression and dominance without any real conversion. On the other hand, if our reactions to such dynamics is to completely avoid a conflict, it may lead us to betray our fundamental beliefs.

Jesus does not imply that we let our enemies walk all over us. Instead,

he instructs us to fight back but in

a different way — with love and not

violence. When we "bless those who

curse [us], [and] pray for those who

treat [us] badly," (Lk 6:28) we continue

to hold fast to our own convictions

without giving in to hatred and

destruction. Ultimately, it is to respect

others and be respected for our

differences even if they disagree with

We do this not out of fear of judgment

or desire for reciprocity and reward,

but because we are living proof that

the kingdom of God is here and that

we are already living in it. Indeed

Jesus warns us of the transactional

approach to relationships that is

prevalent not just in those days but in

our contemporary society as well. "For

if you love those who love you, what

credit is that to you? Even sinners do

the same." (Lk 6:32 NAB) Instead, give

freely without expecting anything

back. St Paul exhorts us in the Second

image of the earthly one, we shall also

bear the image of the heavenly one."



(Lk 6:49 NAB) As children of God, our actions should reflect with clarity the unconditional nature of love.

Sometimes, our struggle to love unconditionally may involve a family member or a friend who is abusive or manipulative. If there is an ongoing relationship with this person, we need even more wisdom, prudence and clear boundaries to love in the right way. What is certain is that Jesus does not mean for us to remain silent in an abusive situation or to let others continue to harm and destroy us.

We can learn from David's example in the First Reading. Before this, David fought and rose in ranks in Saul's army as he successfully engaged the Philistines in battle (1 Sam 17). Saul depended on David to defeat the Philistines but was overcome by jealousy and tried to kill David several times. David did not allow himself to remain in danger and fled. Although his men tried to persuade him that God had delivered his enemy into his grasp, David refused to take revenge nor did he justify the need to kill Saul out of self-protection. He recognised that Saul was still God's anointed and would not raise his hand against him (1 Sam 26:9).

David trusted in God's promise that he will inherit the throne of Israel and that God will deliver his promise in his own way and time. "The Lord repays everyone for his uprightness and loyalty" (1 Sam 26:23). Even though we may be tempted to seek justice for ourselves, we ought to recognise the Lord God as the rightful judge. Our responsibility is to hold fast to our conviction in God and refrain from paying back the violence inflicted upon us. May we grow in our generosity to love purely and altruistically without expecting anything in return.

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Synodal Church -Themed Conversations

In last week's issue, we introduced the Synodal process and how we can journey together for a Synodal Church in the 4 steps mentioned. This week, let us look at the themed conversations or topics that can be used.

JOURNEYING TOGETHER

This is the compulsory 1st question:

Our faith is a journey, which starts when we are baptised and ends when we eventually meet God in Heaven. We invite you to share your journey and experience as a Catholic, and where possible, to suggest what can be done to better our journey together.

Share about your personal journey of faith and if possible, how has this shaped you.

• What hopes & worries do you have for the future of the Catholic Church?

Additional points to help you deepen your reflection:

- What were the joys you experienced?
- What tensions and challenges have you faced?
- What were the moments that brought you closer to God?
- What were the moments that brought you away from God?
- What do you think God is prompting you to, in this life you have led?
- Where do you see the Church walking with you on this journey?

10 THEMED CONVERSATIONS

For subsequent sessions, choose one that fits you/your group. It is recommended to complete one themed conversation at a time. It is NOT compulsory to complete all 10 themed conversations.

1. THE JOURNEYING COMPANIONS: In the Church and in society, we are journeying on the same road. (*Suitable for children*)

As baptised Catholics, we are all companions on this "faith journey" to understand and love God better. Let us think about how we are growing in our faith and who are the

people who are helping us do this. We also think about the ones we need to help to get to know Jesus better.

- In our Church, who are the "companions" in our faith life?
- Who are the people that we have not reached out to? Why?

2. LISTENING: Listening is the first step. We need to have an open mind and heart, and be without prejudice. *(Suitable for children)*

 Pope Francis said that "Listening is never easy. Many times, it is easier to play deaf. Listening means paying attention, wanting to understand, to value, to respect and



to ponder what the other person says." We want to know whether we are really listening to the people around us. Are we listening with an open heart and mind or are we choosing to ignore the people that need our love?

- In the Church, what stops us from listening to those who have different views than ours?
- As the people of God, how can we better listen to the voices of the elderly, the youth, the poor and the socially excluded (e.g. special needs, marginalised, divorced)?

3. SPEAKING OUT: All of us are invited to speak with courage and parrhesia, that is, integration of freedom, truth, and charity. *(Suitable for children)*

Words have the power to either give people hope or to destroy them. As people turn to social media to share



their views, how do we react when we receive false information or fake news? In this topic, we want to explore how ready we are to speak up for what is right and for God's Truth.

- Do I always speak up courageously, honestly and responsibly?
- Do we do this in our Church, family, workplace, school and society? If not, why?

4. CELEBRATION: "Journeying Together" is only possible if it is based on the communal listening to the Word and the celebration of the Eucharist. (*Suitable for children*)

Jesus is inviting every one of us to a celebration every time we go to Mass. For our Almighty God, it is a celebration



every time we take time to pray, to read the Bible and to truly celebrate the Eucharist at Mass. In this topic, we want to think about our prayer life, our attitudes towards Mass, and how close we are to God.

- Share about my prayer life Why and how do I pray? What is my prayer life with God like? When do I turn to God in prayer?
- What can we do to better encourage people to read the Bible and celebrate Mass?

5. CO-RESPONSIBILITY IN THE MISSION: Synodality is at the service of the Church's mission, in which all her members are called to participate. (*Suitable for children*)

We are called to listen to Jesus' call for us to 'Go out and make Disciples of all the Nations.' We do not need to travel to a foreign country to do



this. All Jesus is asking us to do is to live a missionary life. This means we do not just speak about God but we show God's love in a real way through the lives we lead, especially by showing mutual love among us. As the people of God, we share this mission and responsibility to bring people to Jesus. People who see and witness God's goodness in us will then also want to know who this Jesus is.

- What stops me from telling others about Jesus & my faith? Am I shy, afraid or unwilling?
- How are we supporting one another on this Mission to make Jesus known to others?
