# Overcoming blind spots in our lives

8<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time 27 Feb 2022

Sir 27:5-8 1 Cor 15:54-58 Lk 6:39-45

Our gospel this Sunday comes from the end of the Sermon on the Plain, which is Luke's version of the Sermon on the Mount that is found in Matthew's account. Jesus first, has some very strong things to say about false spiritual teachers: "Can a blind man lead a blind man? Will they not both fall into a pit?" (Lk 6:39) He then speaks out against any "unloving attitudes", in contrast to the attitudes of meekness, humility and magnanimity towards our neighbour when we judge each other. (Pope Francis' Homily, 13 Sep 2013)

What insights can we draw from both of Jesus' illustrations of the blind guide and the person with a "plank" in his eye? (Lk 6:41) It is perhaps that both of them lack the clarity and vision needed to help another person avoid the obstacles in front of them. Being led by them will probably lead to disaster – "both will fall into a pit." (Lk 6:39)

Jesus was of course using these two illustrations to point out the spiritual blindness of the scribes and the pharisees who had earlier criticised the disciples for picking grain to eat on a Sabbath – something that the pharisees regarded as forbidden by the law (Lk 6:2). Their legalistic observation of the Sabbath laws made them blind to the true spirit and purpose of the Sabbath and its laws – the revelation of God's love

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and invitation to live by this love.

By contrast, Luke portrays Jesus here not only as a good guide, warning his disciples about the hypocrisy of the scribes and the pharisees (cf Lk 6:42), but also the good physician (perhaps based on Luke's own experience of being a trained physician himself). Most importantly, Luke distinguishes Jesus as the "Shepherd of our Souls" (cf 1 Pt 2:25). Unlike false spiritual teachers, Jesus is the definitive spiritual teacher. Unless we have surrendered to Christ and find in him salvation ourselves, we would not be in a good position to help and teach others.

This is true in the light of our own faults and misperceptions which may blind us. Reflecting on the reading reveals Jesus as the only physician we need, who can remove the "plank" in our eye and help us overcome our blind spots as well as the failings of our sins, weaknesses and ignorance.

A significant step to this requires that we always respond to the invitation of the Divine Physician who can heal us. Our Lord Jesus continually seeks out those who desire healing, pardon and restoration in their journey of faith towards him. When Jesus exposes sin, fear and condemnation in our lives, we are set free and restored to wholeness, ready to be his instruments of healing, pardon and restoration for others as well.

It is important then to realise that having a judgemental spirit will only hinder us from helping others to draw near to Jesus as their Divine Physician. The mention of figs and grapes over the thorns and brambles in the last part of the gospel represents the proverbial saying that you know a tree by its fruit. The fig tree was much-loved by the people of Palestine. It represented fertility, peace and prosperity. In the same vein, grapes produced wine, which was the symbol of joy. Unfortunately, thorns and brambles were only good for burning as fuel for the fire. In the parable of the Sower, these were also the thorns that grew and choked the seed.

Therefore, a person will produce good or bad fruit depending on what is sown in their heart. Having received God's healing mercy and grace, have we allowed his loving-kindness to flood our hearts and permeate our lives? Does he guide our thoughts, words and actions? Are we intentional in being vessels - disciples of Christ who exemplify his spirit which heals rather than crushes?

Kindliness in judgement is a sacred duty. As we begin Lent this Wednesday may we use the time to renew ourselves in the Lord and make room in our hearts for charity, forbearance and kindness. This is the good fruit we are called to produce through the grace and strength of our Lord.

# The Covenant Rituals

Two covenant rituals were held on 13 and 20 Feb for our L9 and L10 teens. The Covenant Ritual is a paraliturgy that allows our teens and their families to examine their baptismal promises, as they prepare to receive the sacrament of confirmation. The ritual comes in 2 parts and is conducted over 2 years.



# **Covenant Ritual 1**

Covenant Ritual 1 involves the use of water to recall the waters of baptism that most of the teens received in their infancy. Our L9 teens were able to re-experience what it was like at their baptism as they had their hands washed by their parents/godparents and were read the words of their baptism. A public commitment was also made to God, in the presence of the community, to continue on this journey in faith.



"Going through baptism as an infant, I did not have the capacity to make my own decision to enter the Catholic faith. This covenant ritual gave me the opportunity to voluntarily jump into Jesus' open arms and further my faith in him. It was a refreshing change from our usual catechism session and the ritual conveyed the feeling of renewal and new life so powerfully. The support my mum provided was reassuring too."

# **Covenant Ritual 2**

The 2nd Covenant Ritual involves the use of light to recall the light of baptism that they received when they were baptised. Our L10 teens reflected on how our Faith was handed to them through the passing of the light from a candle. They also recalled the commitment they made during their first Covenant Ritual as they enter the final leg of their preparation before receiving the sacrament of confirmation.




