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Gospel of the Outcast

24th Sunday in Ordinary Time 11 Sep 2022

Ex 32:7-11, 13-14 1 Tim 1:12-17 Lk 15:1-32 (or 1-10)

This Sunday's gospel text begins a series of stories in Luke, which has traditionally been known as 'The Gospel of the Outcast'. For centuries, Luke 15 has been seen as God's invitation to those who have strayed away, but also to those who have stayed the path.

In this regard, the chapter opens with a description of "tax collectors and sinners" being near Jesus. For this group, the message of mercy in Jesus' stories is clear: the shepherd seeks out the lost sheep; the woman sweeps the house for the lost coin. God not only welcomes sinners, but he actively reaches out to them and invites them back into the fold.

In his book "The Name of God *Mercy*", Pope Francis thus emphasises the Church's critical role in demonstrating mercy: "The Church does not exist to condemn people but to bring about an encounter with the visceral love of God's mercy. I often say that in order for this to happen, it is necessary to go out: to go out from the churches and the parishes, to go outside and look for people, where they live, where they suffer, and where they hope. I like to use the image of a field hospital to describe this 'Church that goes forth'".

St Paul fortifies this message in our Second Reading: "Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners... and if mercy has been shown to me, it is because Jesus Christ meant to make me the greatest evidence of his inexhaustible patience for all the other people who would later have to trust in him to come to eternal life". The Lord's mercy is therefore not simply a psychological balm to those burdened by guilt and shame; it is salvific. Jesus not only seeks out and forgives sinners, he saves them.

But the Gospel of the Outcast is not just for the sinners; it is also for the 'righteous'. Indeed, in the same opening paragraph of this Sunday's text, we see Pharisees and scribes also listening - albeit while grumbling - to Jesus.

Jesus' message to this group is more subtle; as such messages to the proud and self-righteous must be. In Jesus' stories of the Gospel of the Outcast, everyone is called to celebrate. Both the shepherd who finds his lost sheep and the woman that finds her lost coin invite their friends and neighbours to "rejoice". Most tellingly, in the story of the Prodigal Son, the good father goes out to coax the elder son and invite him to join in the celebration.

In other words, both the sinners and the scribes, as well as the tax collectors and the Pharisees, are one people that should rejoice and celebrate together. The finding of a sinner should not imply the loss of a saint (or scribe).

For we are all God's people, a point illustrated in the First Reading. When God tells Moses that "your people whom you brought out of Egypt have apostatised", Moses responds by reminding God that these are "people of yours whom you brought out of the land of Egypt with arm outstretched and mighty hand" [emphasis added]. And God relented and forgave.

In the face of God's inexhaustible mercy, the line between the sinner and the righteous therefore blurs. Compared to God, none of us are worthy. Sinner or scribe, we are all outcasts - cast out of Eden - and we all need to hear the Gospel. For all of us are sinners, all of us need God, and all of us are God's people.

It is against this backdrop that we can understand what Pope Francis meant when he said: "Who am I to judge?"

RCIY Retreat: Who Do You Say I Am?

Last weekend, fourteen youths attended their first RCIY retreat. Held on SFX parish grounds, they were led by the enthusiastic service team and members from the 1Cor12 group. The 3-day retreat entitled, 'Who Do You Say I Am?", began on Friday evening and ended with the 11am mass on Sunday.

Through a series of presentations, sharing, para-liturgies, prayer and worship, the attendees were led through the story of Zacchaeus to a deeper awareness of their identity as sons and daughters of God. New friendships were made and sealed as they bonded over games and hearty home-cooked meals! Some came without quite knowing what to expect, while some had questions and doubts. But as the weekend progressed, barriers fell and hearts were opened and softened. The Holy Spirit was gently working in their midst, leading them to connecting with Jesus in a personal way and experiencing His presence and love. The personal testimonies of the presenters also helped to give context to lessons from the Zacchaeus story – how in our own lives, Jesus doesn't save his mercy for the "worthy," but lavishes it on everyone, because we are all in need of His saving love. Jesus' love and unconditional acceptance of Zacchaeus took him by surprise and changed him radically for the better.

Let's continue to pray for each of our young enquirers as they respond to God's invitation to seek Him and continue their RCIY journey towards baptism next year. Here are some of the inspiring sharings from the participants.

The Story of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross

Early in the fourth century, Saint Helena, mother of the Roman Emperor Constantine, went to Jerusalem in search of the holy places of Christ's life. She razed the second-century Temple of Aphrodite, which tradition held was built over the Savior's tomb, and her son built the Basilica of the Holy Sepulcher on that spot. During the excavation, workers found three crosses. Legend has it that the one on which Jesus died was identified when its touch healed a dying woman.

The cross immediately became an object of veneration. At a Good Friday celebration in Jerusalem toward the end of the fourth century, according to an eyewitness, the wood was taken out of its silver container and placed on a table together with the inscription Pilate ordered placed above Jesus' head: Then "all the people pass through one by one; all of them bow down, touching the cross and the inscription, first with their foreheads, then with their eyes; and, after kissing the cross, they move on."

To this day, the Eastern Churches, Catholic and Orthodox alike, celebrate the Exaltation of the Holy Cross on the September anniversary of the basilica's dedication. The feast entered the Western calendar in the seventh century after Emperor Heraclius recovered the cross from the Persians, who had carried it off in 614, 15 years earlier. According to the story, the emperor intended to carry the cross back into Jerusalem himself, but was unable to move forward until he took off his imperial garb and became a barefoot pilgrim.

Reflection

More than anything else, the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross is a celebration and commemoration of God's greatest work: his salvific death on the Cross and His Resurrection, through which death was defeated and the doors to Heaven opened.

The entrance antiphon for the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross is: "We should glory in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, for he is our salvation, our life and our resurrection: through him we are saved and made free."
