Jesus' Daily Gamble

31st Sunday in Ordinary Time
30 Oct 2022

Wis 11:22-12:2
2 Th 1:11-2:2
Lk 19:1-10

To our shame and regret, many of us have complained against a priest or a fellow churchgoer just as the crowd in today's gospel complained about Jesus and Zacchaeus, "He has gone to stay at a sinner's house..." (Lk 19:7) Why is it that we cannot be like St Paul in the second reading, "continually [praying]" that God will make everyone "worthy of his call" and increase everyone's "desires for goodness" so that "the name of our Lord Jesus Christ will be glorified..." (2 Th 1:11-12)

Perhaps we have become so sanctimonious because we have forgotten that we are only "a grain of dust" and "a drop of morning dew." (Wis 11:22) Our lives are ephemeral and "we should imagine ourselves standing before God at the end of time...[for] it is closer to the resurrection, which is the meaning and purpose of life." (Pope Francis, Homily, 4 Nov 2019)

Or perhaps our mistaken sanctity is due to being "lost" (Lk 19:10) in cynicism just as others, like Zacchaeus, have become "lost" in the easy temptations of the world. Zacchaeus became a Roman peon attracted by the "perks" of over-collecting taxes for himself. Our cynicism could be a coping mechanism from the onslaught of relativistic "new normal" ideologies.

How can we avoid becoming "lost" either way? The writer of Wisdom invites us to a time of recollection and become aware again that we all originate from the Father's heart of love: "Yes, you love all that exists, you hold nothing of what you have

made in abhorrence...how, had you not willed it, could a thing persist, how be conserved if not called forth by you?...all things are yours, Lord, lover of life..." (Wis 11:24-26)

Reflecting on God's sustaining and pursuing love which is also seen in today's gospel, Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI describes this divine pursuit as "a gamble", "Zacchaeus was very rich but despised by his fellow citizens. So when Jesus... stopped at the house of Zacchaeus, he caused a general scandal. The Lord, however, knew exactly what he was doing. He wanted, so to speak, to gamble, and he won the bet: Zacchaeus, deeply moved by Jesus' visit, decided to change his life..." (Angelus, 31 October 2010)

Jesus' love made Zacchaeus whole again. He needed nothing else, "...I am going to give half my property to the poor...if I have cheated anybody I will pay him back four times the amount." (Lk 19:8)

Jesus continues to gamble and bet on us when he comes to visit us every day in the Eucharist. Quoting Pope St Leo the Great, Pope Francis reminds us that Jesus is truly present in the Eucharist, "that which was visible in Jesus, that which could be seen with the eyes and touched with the hands, his words and his gestures, the concreteness of the

incarnate Word — everything of Him had passed into the celebration of the sacraments...Here lies all the powerful beauty of the liturgy [for it is] given also to us the possibility of a true encounter with Him." (Desiderio Desideravi "On Liturgical Formation" n. 9 & 10, 29 Jun 2022)

So the small Eucharistic host we receive today in our hands and into ourselves is not a thing but someone. Christ is coming to stay in our "house" in an even more intimate way than when he visited Zacchaeus, for he is coming as our resurrected and glorified Lord. In awe, we acknowledge his desire to share his power and glory with us when we say, "Lord, I am not worthy that you should enter under my roof..."

Christ won his gamble on Zacchaeus. Will he win his bet on us today? Will we say "Amen!" - "So Be It!" to being made whole in Holy Communion with Jesus such that we can cast off anything that tempts us away from him? Will we say "Amen!" to being a "lover of life" and look on others with Jesus' sustaining and pursuing love, hoping in their increasing "desires for goodness." (cf Wis 11:24-26, 2 Th 1:11) Will we glorify him by welcoming his True Presence in the Eucharist to transform us for our resurrection?


CPS LUNCHTIME TALK: ROOTED IN CHRIST

RCIA - Rite of Acceptance 2022

On Saturday, October 8, inquirers of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA), participated in the Day of Recollection (DOR). It was a time specially dedicated for reflection on their RCIA journey which began in July; in particular, on why God is calling them, and to discern their readiness to participate in the Rite of Acceptance (ROA).

The following Sunday, October 15, a total of 19 inquirers from both RCIA and RCIY (Rite of Christian Initiation of Youths) partook in the ROA. Thanks to the easing of Covid-19 restrictions, the ROA was back to being celebrated at the Sunday 9am Mass, enabling our parish community to take an active part in the celebration.

After the rite, the inquirers went through a change of identity to become Catechumens. In the months to come, they will go through the Rite of Election as they further prepare for their initiation into the Christian faith by baptism, confirmation and the Eucharist.

We also joyfully greet those we call Candidates who are already one with us by baptism, and who now wish to complete their Christian initiation through confirmation and the Eucharist, into the full communion of the Catholic Church.

Let us keep our brothers and sisters in Christ in our prayers for a fulfilling spiritual journey.

"During the ROA, I felt solemn as it was another 'Yes' to God, but this time in front of the church. In my heart, I was quite expectant as I recall vividly the anointing and the signing of the senses which felt like a nod of acknowledgment to every decision I have made to get closer and to know God better.
