Worship - Pagans show the way

The Epiphany of the Lord 8 Jan 2023

ls 60:1-6 Eph 3:2-3, 5-6 Mt 2:1–12

Pagans normally play supporting roles in the bible - but this week, they are the main characters in all the three Readings. Even the Star of Bethlehem is prophesied by a pagan prophet, Balaam (Num 24:17).

This underscores the revelation that salvation is universal, not exclusive to the Jews. The Church celebrates this as Epiphany, *"the manifestation of Jesus as Messiah of Israel, Son of God and Savior of the world."* (cf CCC 528)

In the Gospel, the Magi represent "the first-fruits of the nations, who welcome the good news of salvation through the Incarnation." (cf CCC 528) They fulfil Isaiah's prophesy of pagan nations converting and converging in the "New Jerusalem" (1st Reading).

In the book Jesus of Nazareth, Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI says that the Magi are wise because "[t]hey represent the inner dynamic of religion toward self-transcendence, which involves a search for truth, a search for the true God." They overcome their old beliefs and pagan ways, take risks and struggle through deserts and mountains to find the Lord. Paul calls this the mystery of conversion (2nd Reading).

In contrast, the self-absorbed King Herod can only see Jesus as a rival. Paranoid with self-preservation, he takes the broad and easy path, marked by sloth and treachery - he cannot find Jesus.

There is no easy way to become like Christ. Suffering and self-denial are central to the Christian life (CCC 618). Submitting to God's will and responding to his call mean choosing the narrow gate that leads to salvation (Mt 7:13-14).

We must learn to see God's plan of salvation in all things. In a sense, God is like a matchmaker of disordered natures. People pitted against people, create opportunities in conflicts for our disordered nature to surface, like scum in soup. The resulting pain and suffering remind us of Jesus' call to take up our cross and follow him (Mt 16:24). The greater the disorder, the heavier the cross.

So, when mistakes are made and relationships sour, examine our conscience. Prosecute ourselves, not others, whether victim or perpetrator. Uncover the disorders causing the mess. Work towards converting vices into virtues - for instance, if it is pride, find ways to be humble. Be first to apologise and first to forgive, regardless of who is right or wrong. In forgiving and praying for others, we are the first to be healed. When we are at peace, fighting stops, healing starts. Salvation is about restoring our relationship with God and man.

More than responding to God's call, the Magi give us an example of how to seek the Lord and how to behave in His presence. They start their journey with worship in mind: *"We have seen his star in the East, and have come to worship him"* (Mt 2:2). Upon arrival in Bethlehem, *"they fell down and worshiped him [with gold, frankincense and myrrh]."* (Mt 2:11)

King Herod too, uses the word worship (Mt 2:8), but his intention is murder. He manipulates, intimidates and dominates. All male children in Bethlehem, 2 years old or under, are killed (Mt 2:16). When we do not worship God, like King Herod, we end up worshiping ourselves. Without the sense of worship, we lose direction in the Christian life. There is a grave risk of using God instead of serving him, of honouring ourselves instead of glorifying God.

Christian life is a love affair with God. It is more than just doing his will. Worship makes God the centre of our lives, as lovers do with those whom they love. Worship means making God's plan more important than Netflix, Tik-Tok, Youtube, Instagram. It can be as simple as kneeling and proclaiming: "My Lord and my God!" - to be embraced, loved, healed, strengthened, transformed. In doing so, we learn to reject what should not be worshipped - money, consumerism, pleasure, success, ourselves - all created things.

The Magi's journey evokes every man's journey to Christ. Epiphany should be an event that is repeated every day. Each morning, pray for the grace to live the day, the way the Lord has planned for us. Choices have eternal consequences. Discern his call, surrender our will, worship the Lord. When we magnify Jesus in every encounter, we become epiphanies for others and lead them to conversion.

Tribute to **Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI** (Joseph Ratzinger): **His Thoughts & His Works**

BIRTH TO PRIESTLY ORDINATION (16 April 1927 - 29 June 1951)

Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI was born Joseph Ratzinger on Holy Saturday, 16 April 1927 and baptised on the same day. The baptismal register (below) as updated to the time of his elevation to Cardinal (Kardinal) on 27 June 1977. (Source: Pope Benedict XVI A Personal Portrait, p22)

On the 60th anniversary of his priestly ordination in 2011, then Pope Benedict XVI returned to Freising Cathedral. He said, ... Then came the laying on of hands, and finally Cardinal Faulhaber proclaimed to us: "I do not call you servants, but friends"; at that moment, I experienced my priestly ordination as an initiation into the community of Jesus' friends, called to be with him and to proclaim his message." "In those days, it was the

custom with First Masses for people who wanted to receive the new priest's blessing to sign up at the rectory office...each of us received a list of all the places we were to visit, and so we spent the next few days calling on all these members of the parish and blessing them...it made us happy to see what a grace it was to receive holy orders and to have the privilege of handing this blessing on to the people. Again and again, we experienced how ardently the people waited for the priest, a man who was called by God to serve them". (Source: My Brother, The Pope,

After his Ordination, Ratzinger was appointed chaplain at the parish of St. Martin in Munich. In 1953. he presented his dissertation on Augustine of Hippo titled "The People and the House of God in Augustine's Doctrine of the Church." His habilitation (qualification for professorship) was on Bonaventure which he completed in 1957, "...my reading

of Bonaventure, were later on, very important for me at the time of the [Vatican Council II] discussion on revelation, Scripture, and tradition. Because if Bonaventure is right, then revelation precedes Scripture and becomes deposited in Scripture but is not simply identical with it. This in turn means that revelation is always something greater than what is merely written down. And this again means that there can be no such thing as pure sola scriptura ('by Scripture alone'), because an essential element of Scripture is the Church as understanding subject and with this the fundamental sense of tradition is already given." 
