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# Jesus, **Personification of** the Good News

3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time Sunday of the Word of God 22 Jan 2023

Is 8:23-9:3 1 Cor 1:10-13,17 Mt 4:12-23

On 30 September 2019, the Feast of St Jerome, Pope Francis in his apostolic letter Aperuit illis instituted the annual observance of the 3rd Sunday of Ordinary Time, for the celebration, study and dissemination of Scripture, and named it Sunday of the Word of God.

This special feast is a needful reminder for us that, through Jesus the person and the Word, our Father reveals himself and his will to us. Jesus the Good News, who is "the way, the truth and the life" (In 14:6) also tells us that "all that the Father has is mine; therefore I said that he will take what is mine and declare it to you." (Jn 16:15).

The readings focus on the Word incarnate bringing hope and joy, and a salvific freedom from spiritual death, through a unified, counter-cultural way of living in truth and love.

Isaiah's oracle talks about the degradation of the northern tribes of Israel under the Assyrian empire, but that in the gloom and doom, an unstoppable light will inevitably shine forth and overcome the darkness, bringing hope, comfort and joy. That "great light" (Is 9:2) is Christ himself, liberating the world from the slavery of sin.

Jesus as the light and salvation of the world in the Psalm emphasises our need to ask for the grace of enduring fortitude, to ceaselessly seek the Lord in his house in the sacraments, gaze on his brilliance at Holy Hour and live faithfully for the salvation of our souls.

The theme of hope in Jesus continues through the Second Reading, where St Paul underscores that we are only as strong as our unity in heart and spirit. His sentiments echo our Lord's petition, "I pray not only for them, but also for those who will believe in me through their word, so that they may all be one, as you, Father, are in me and I in you..." (Jn 17:20-21)

The Gospel brings us full circle, to fulfil the prophecy of Isaiah in the First Reading, where Jesus, the One Great Light, preaches the Gospel of repentance, a return to God, for the "kingdom of heaven is at hand" (Matt 4:17). Jesus' mission as the divine king is also to re-unify and re-establish the 12 tribes of Israel under His new law of love and mercy, where, through His 12 Apostles, his fishers of men, he will heal by being the remedy for sin.

Today, what does it mean for us Christians to experience the joy and love of the Lord through lesus the Word? It is, first of all, to know the Word as a person by right relationship.

To have fullness of life and experience supernatural joy, and to love as the Word calls us to, we need to go beyond mere biblical knowledge. Our daily encounters with the Word must grow deeper and stronger through the practice of praying with Scripture, like the Lectio Divina and Ignatian Contemplation.

From knowing him, internalising his

teachings, and continuously falling in love with the very personification of Scripture – spending copious time

just being with, talking and listening to, and emulating him (that's what being in love with someone makes us want to do!) - we will eventually arrive at the hardest part that God's grace alone can achieve: making the Word and Jesus come alive for others, evangelising, soul-fishing like the Apostles - through loving actions in our lives.

Said Emeritus Pope Benedict XVI, "Being Christian is not the result of an ethical choice or a lofty idea, but the encounter with an event, a person, which gives life a new horizon and a decisive direction." (cf Deus Caritas Est,1)

"For the word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing to the division of soul and spirit, of joints and marrow, and discerning the thoughts and intentions of the heart." (Heb 4:12)

Jesus the Word separates sinfulness from holiness, sadness from joy, darkness from light, despondency from hope. Jesus the Word clarifies our position and charts the way we are to live, launching us on our heavenly exodus in him.

"Christ, the Son of God made man, is the Father's one, perfect and unsurpassable Word. In him he has said everything; there will be no other word than this one." (CCC 65)

The phrase lectio divina means "divine reading" in Latin and is a fitting name for this prayer practice of listening to Scripture with the ear of the heart. Lectio divina (often called "lectio" for short) is a dialogue with God through Scripture that includes the whole self: thoughts, images, memories, desires, etc. The movements within lectio divina involve reading, listening to, responding to and resting in the Word of God. It can be practiced alone or with a community.

## THE ORIGINS OF LECTIO DIVINA

With encouragement from the Church Fathers, lectio divina entered the daily prayer of the early monastic communities in the 6th century as a way of communicating with God through Scripture. It has developed over time into the practice we know today of reading God's Word and attending to his presence therein. The four movements within lectio divina are reading, meditation, prayer and contemplation.

## WHY YOU MIGHT PRAY WITH LECTIO DIVINA

Lectio divina encourages us to become receptive to the divine Word in order to form us into the image of Christ. Pope Francis speaks of lectio divina in *Evangelii Gaudium* as a "way of listening to what the Lord wishes to tell us in his Word and of letting ourselves be transformed by the Spirit" (152). If you desire to incorporate more Scripture into your prayer life and pay closer attention to the movements of God, lectio divina might be a place to start.

## **HOW TO PRACTICE LECTIO DIVINA**



1. Select a Scripture passage Before starting your prayer, select a passage from Scripture to use for your lectio divina. It can be from the Old or New Testament, but it shouldn't be too long. The length of a reading from Mass works well. Often, people choose to pray with a reading from the day's Lectionary or the Mass for the upcoming Sunday.



2. Prepare for prayer Before entering into the prayer, prepare yourself physically and mentally. Begin by sitting comfortably, placing both feet on the ground, with posture upright and hands open on your lap as if waiting to receive a gift from God. Then, abandon any agenda, worries or thoughts you bring to this prayer and entrust these things to the providence of God. Ask for the grace to be receptive to what God will speak to you through this Scripture reading.



## 3. Read (lectio)

Begin by slowly and meditatively reading your Scripture passage out loud. Listen for a particular word or phrase that speaks to you at this moment and sit with it for a time.



4. Meditate (meditatio) Read the same passage a second time. As you re-engage the text, let the word or phrase that stood out become your invitation to dialogue with God. Allow the word or phrase to wash over you and permeate your thoughts and feelings.



### 5. Pray (oratio)

Read the text a third time. What is God saying to you in these words? What do you want to say to God? What feelings do these words raise up in you? Share your answers with God.



(contemplatio) Read the text a final time. As you do, release the word or phrase you have been praying with. Be still and rest in God's embrace. What gift has God given you to take away from this prayer? To what action might God be inviting you? Thank God for this gift and invitation as you conclude your prayer.
