Jesus' Temptations in the Desert

1st Sunday of Lent 26 Feb 2023

Gen 2:7-9, 3:1-7 Rom 5:12-19 Mt 4:1-11

As we enter into the season of Lent, this Sunday's gospel reminds us that Jesus, too, fasted for forty days before beginning his public ministry. In turn, these forty days recall Israel's forty years of wandering in the desert, the forty days that Moses spent on Mount Sinai, and the forty days that Elijah went without food or water at Mount Horeb. (cf Jos 5:6; Ex 24:18; 1 Kgs 19:8). In other words, this is a period of prayer, temptation, and wandering, but also a period of journeying closer towards the Lord.

his And while Adam faced temptation in a garden, Jesus the New Adam - overcame his temptations in the desert. As Pope Benedict XVI points out in Jesus of Nazareth: From the Baptism in the Jordan to the Transfiguration, "The desert - the opposite image of the garden – becomes the place of reconciliation and healing." The Second Reading therefore concludes: "As by one man's disobedience many were made sinners, so by one man's obedience many will be made righteous." (Rom 5:19)

Let us now deal with each temptation. First, Jesus was tempted to turn stones into bread. But why is this a temptation at all? Should not the Messiah solve world hunger, and more generally, all social problems? In fact, did not Jesus himself multiply loaves to feed the thousands who followed him?

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Jesus' response, quoting Deut 8:3, is the key: "Man does not live on bread alone but on every word that comes from the mouth of God." As the German Jesuit Alfred Delp wrote, "Bread is important, freedom is more important, but most important of all is unbroken fidelity and faithful adoration."

What Jesus rejects therefore is not bread *per se*, but the prioritisation of bread over God. Or as Henri Nouwen writes in *In the Name of Jesus*, Jesus rejects the temptation to be relevant. This is in contrast to Jesus' multiplication of the loaves, where his followers first hunger for him and his teaching, and only then, for bread. In this regard, Pope Benedict XVI argues that the failure of the Marxist experiment demonstrated the folly of focussing on food at the expense of faith.

Second, Jesus is tempted to throw himself off the Temple and let God save him – or in his own words, to "put the Lord your God to the test". Again, what is at stake here is the primacy of God. To subject God to experiment is to deny his sovereignty by placing ourselves above him. As Pope Benedict XVI writes, "To think like that is to make oneself God."

Third, Jesus is tempted with kingship over the world. For indeed, Jesus is the king; but his is the kingdom of God. This is a temptation that has plagued us throughout history, be it in the Christian empires of old or the modern prosperity gospels today. As Pope Benedict XVI puts it, "This temptation to use power to secure the faith has arisen again and again in varied forms throughout the centuries, and again and again faith has risked being suffocated in the embrace of power... For the fusion of faith and political power always comes at a price: faith becomes the servant of power and must bend to its criteria."

Fundamentally, the temptations that Adam and Jesus faced point to the same evil – "the act of pushing God aside because we perceive him as secondary, if not actually superfluous and annoying, in comparison with all the apparently far more urgent matters that fill our lives", as Pope Benedict XVI writes.

This, then is what we are called to give up this Lent: all the "urgent matters" that distract us from "worship[ing] the Lord our God and serv[ing] him alone".

Lent has officially begun! Last Wednesday, we marked our foreheads with ashes, a reminder of our mortality and the temporary nature of our earthly lives. The Church has given us this beautiful season to help us prepare our souls to celebrate the most important event in the history of the world: the passion, death, and resurrection of our Saviour, Jesus Christ. Lent is an opportunity to renew our Christian faith through the three pillars of Lent - intentional prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, to wean ourselves from all that keeps us away from God. These spiritual disciplines can potentially change us to become better disciples of Christ.

Three initiatives will be introduced this Lent in our parish, which old and young can participate in. Let us make a personal and communal effort to mark this Lent with repentance, reflection and spiritual growth, that we might experience a truly joyful Easter!

This Lent, let us challenge ourselves to go beyond the gesture of 'giving up something', especially if it is something sinful or a vice (since those should not be part of our lives in the first instance.) Be conscious instead of accompanying our acts of 'giving up' with something positive as provided in the three Lenten initiatives. Ask the Lord to grace you with the desire to go beyond token sacrifices, that this Lent will change us in meaningful and lasting ways – there is no better response to thank God for his great sacrifice of love for us.

"The Seven Last Words of Jesus" by Fr Alfred McBride



The "Seven Last Words of Jesus" refer to seven statements made by Jesus as he hung on the cross. These seven "words" are scattered across the gospels and are ordered not by strict historical chronology but by pious tradition. Three of the "words" come from Luke's Gospel, three from John's Gospel and one is found in both the Gospels of Matthew and Mark:

- 1. "Father, forgive them, they know not what they do." (Luke 23:34)
- 2. "Amen, I say to you, today you will be with me in paradise." (Luke 23:43)
- 3. "Woman, behold, your son...Behold your mother." (John 19:26-27)
- 4. "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" (Matthew 27:46; Mark 15:34)
- 5. "I thirst." (John 19:28)
- 6. "It is finished." (John 19:30)
- 7. "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit." (Luke 23:46)

Drawing on archaeological, historical, traditional, scriptural and theological sources, Norbertine priest, Fr Alfred McBride, has put together a rich meditation on Jesus' last words from the cross. Jesus' last words reveal the full extent of the suffering and pain he shares with us in his human nature and his divine longing, as the Son of God, for man to be reconciled with his creator and with each other.

St Jerome Library has put up a visual display of Fr McBride's book consisting of excerpts from his meditations and pictures of the locations, relics and artwork he has referenced such as the Chapel of Adam (Golgotha), Fortress Antonia (Pilate's Praetorium), Shroud of Turin and the Roman flagrum used in the scourging of Christ.

The display will be on until the Easter Triduum in St Jerome Library which is open every Sunday 8am to 1pm.









(L to R): Archaeological evidence of crucifixion - a nail driven through a heel bone; a cap rather than a wreath crown of thorns based on the blood and puncture marks of the crucified man from the Shroud of Turin and evidence that nails are driven through the wrist-bones and not the palms.
