The Good Shepherd

4th Sunday of Easter (Good Shepherd Sunday) 30 Apr 2023

Ac 2:14, 36-41 1 Pt 2:20-25 In 10:1-10

Along with bread, wine, and water, the shepherd is one of the key images that John's gospel is built around. In this regard, many of us are familiar with the persona of Jesus as The Good Shepherd.

It is therefore surprising that the shepherd discourse in John 10, which this Sunday's gospel introduces, does not begin with Jesus declaring that "I am the Good Shepherd" (In 10:11). Instead, Jesus opens with the image that "I am the gate for the sheep" (Jn 10:7). Accordingly, anyone who enters by that gate is the "shepherd of the sheep" (Jn 10:2).

In this manner, Jesus establishes the criterion for all other shepherds of his flock - they exercise their ministry only through Jesus, the one and only Good Shepherd.

Let us now examine four motifs in the shepherd discourse that Pope Benedict XVI identifies in lesus of Nazareth: From the Baptism in the Jordan to the Transfiguration.

First, the Good Shepherd gives life in abundance, unlike the thief who "comes only to steal and kill and destroy" (Jn 10:10). This builds on Old Testament imagery: "I will feed them with good pasture, and upon the mountain country of Israel shall be their pasture" (Ez 34:14). Similarly, the psalmist in today's readings proclaims that the Lord will shepherd



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us to fresh and green pastures, restful waters, and along the right path.

In this sense, the "life in abundance" that Jesus promises is diametrically opposed to the greed and selfinterest of the thief, who regards the sheep as property that he owns and exploits. Instead, humanity is nourished by the "mountain country of Israel", which the Church Fathers saw as the "life-giving food of God's word", as Pope Benedict points out.

Second, the Good Shepherd lays down his life for his sheep. Here, the images of the shepherd and bread coincide. As the Church Fathers have alluded, Jesus is also the Bread of Life, broken and given for all. Jesus therefore gives life by giving himself, for he is life.

Third, the Good Shepherd knows his "own" flock and his "own" know him. In this context, the "ownership" that Jesus speaks of is more about belonging than mere possession.

In Jesus of Nazareth, Pope Benedict distinguishes things, which are property that we can own, possess, and transfer; and human beings, who are "free creatures in their own right". The *what* is different from the who. Hence, while we can possess things; we belong to one another, "not as property, but in mutual responsibility".

And this belonging is rooted in the deep knowledge that we have of one another, the same way parents know their children and the Good Shepherd knows his flock. Whereas for the thieves, tyrants, and thrones of the world, human beings are merely things that they possess.

Fourth, the motif of unity. Later in John's gospel, Jesus declares that his flock comprises not only the

scattered sheep of the house of Israel, but all "the children of God who are scattered abroad" (In 11:52). For these "other sheep, that are not of this fold", Jesus will have to "bring them also and they will heed [his] voice". Thus, there is "one flock, one Shepherd" (Jn 10:16).

As Pope Benedict writes, "The Logos who became man in lesus is the Shepherd of all men, for all have been created through the one Word; however scattered they may be, yet as coming from him and bound toward him they are one." Put simply, there is one flock because there is only one Shepherd.

Since the third century, Christians have been inspired by the image of the shepherd seeking out the lost sheep, carrying it upon his shoulders, and bringing it home to join his flock. As we celebrate Easter, let us recall how the Good Shepherd carries us too on his shoulders to bring us all home, how he gave his life for us, and how he himself is life.
