









Highway to Heaven

5th Sunday of Easter 7 May 2023

Ac 6:1-7 1 Pt 2:4-9 Jn 14:1-12

We are in Eastertide, but the gospel flashes back to the last supper, reminding us: "Do not let your hearts be troubled" (Jn 14:1).

This is no empty platitude. Neither is it a mundane "cheer up".

Jesus follows up: "I am the Way, the Truth and the Life" (Jn 14:6). As a commentator once said, "You don't go to heaven to find Christ. You go to Christ to find heaven".

The disciples get a dose of stress management. If they keep their sights on heaven and keep their faith in Jesus, they will overcome the trials of life. They will have inner peace.

The key - know Jesus and they will know God (Jn 14:7-11).

But the disciples fail to understand or keep their faith. Their struggles with fear in the events following the last supper is a portrait of us too. They are subtle denials of Christ compared to those who scream "crucify him". Their effects are nonetheless piercing.

What are some problems faced by the disciples and others that parallel our lives and rob us of peace, unwittingly?

Drowsiness: Peter, James and John doze off in the garden of Gethsemane - unwilling or unable to deal with the stress of the moment. Three times, Jesus warns them to stay awake and pray, lest they fall into temptation. But they sleep anyway.




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Deflection: Pontius Pilate succumbs to fear of the crowd and condemns Jesus to death. He deflects responsibility by washing his hands in front of the crowd. His career was more important than justice.

Doing the right thing could cost us our job, our reputation, our friends, or simply make our life more difficult. Instead of assuming responsibility, do we blame, accuse, or excuse?

Staying faithful to Jesus leads to true peace, but it is indeed difficult. "Thou shall not kill" makes sense to almost everyone. But "love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you", is a new moral law that makes sense only through grace.

It is through grace that Jesus promises: "whoever believes in me will perform the same works as I do myself, he will perform even greater works, because I am going to the Father" (Jn 14:12).

Grace comes through the Sacraments - the "greater works" that priests, by the power of the Holy Spirit, will perform *in persona Christi*. Not only is Jesus the road to heaven, the road will take the shape of the Sacraments of the Church (Dr. Brant Pitre).

So, take courage - we don't need to drowse, destroy, deny, or deflect. The Sacraments give us grace to live a beatific life. Be like Mary, faithful to the end. She stands poised and resolute at the foot of the cross, not sprawled and distraught.

A common human technique for dealing with stress and the hardships of life is to become numb and drowsy. Sloth in life leads to moral slumber because vigilance against sin can be equally stressful. We anaesthetise ourselves with mindless entertainment, meaningless distractions, alcohol and drugs. Prayers and spirituality pose too much hassle and too many uncomfortable questions.

Destruction: When Peter finally awakens, he cuts off the ear of Malchus, the servant of the high priest.

For many of us, our sword is our mouth. Against those whom we dislike or oppose, we lash out in slander, gossip, insinuation and innuendos - bent on destroying reputation, dignity and harmony.

It is worst in cyberspace - anonymity numbs our senses. They go by many names - cyberbullying, doxxing, trolling, ghosting, cancel culture, woke culture... We need to confront evil, resist injustice, and speak clearly to a confused world - lovingly. There is no need to win every encounter. Plant seeds instead, confident that in Christ, truth will prevail.

Denial: Confronted with the fearful prospect of being condemned along with Jesus, Peter denies being one of his followers three times.

Have you ever wondered what it's like to get behind a book, to know its story and its author?

The librarians at St. Jerome Library were excited about having Father Henry Siew over last week to share some of his beloved books, **"Smart Way of Loving"**, **"Follow Christ and Be A Catholic"**, as well as **"Pitfalls in Christianity"**.

Father Henry began the session with a personal sharing on serving as a Marriage Encounter (ME) Presenting Priest. With a university background in social work and sociology, and returning fresh from theology studies in Rome, he initially took offence to expectations placed on him to become an ME Presenting Priest. His second experience assisting at one Chinese language ME weekend, however, began to move him deeply as the personal sharing sessions focusing on sharing their emotions and hurts began to help him to understand himself and the great needs of those who are married.

By nature, an introvert but because of the pastoral needs he saw, Father Henry worked on gradually developing extroverted skills in order to help others. Subsequently, he found himself serving as Presenting Priest for 2 ME weekends each year.

ANOINTING OF THE SICK



The sacrament can be administered to any Catholic awaiting serious surgery, suffering from serious illness or weakened by old age. Anointing may be given before admission for the anticipated medical procedure. Contact the Parish Office to request for a priest. In emergencies, priests of the church nearest to the hospital can be contacted.

INFANT BAPTISM

Spiritual preparation is held on the last Friday of every odd month. Baptism is held on the first/second Sunday of the following month. For registration, please refer to our website.

FUNERAL

Please check with the Parish Office for priest availability and Mass timing before confirming the timing at the crematorium. For prayers at the wake, please contact the Parish Office.

MARRIAGE

Contact the Parish Office 12 months before your intended date to book the church premises and ensure that your presiding priest is able to make that date.

The Smart Way of Loving, first published in Jul 2009, is a collection of 40 talks from these ME Weekends. These talks are grouped under 4 sections:

- 1 Knowing You, Knowing Me - Mutual Understanding and Acceptance
- II. Knowing "We" The Dynamics of Marital Relationships
- III. Connecting "You" and "Me" Intimate Communication is the Meeting of Hearts
- IV. Growing "We" Keep Your Priority and Build Your Support Systems.

Father Henry wanted to have a style of writing that is pastoral, meaning that the book is set in a relatable marital context with real-life examples.


Follow Christ and Be A Catholic is

a collection of presentations from the RCIA program. Typically, we see Salvation History presented in a linear pattern starting with Adam and Eve, followed by the Fall, etc. Since such an approach may be slightly removed for some people to resonate with today, 'Follow Christ and Be A Catholic' focuses on Jesus with a Christ-centred approach.

A topic like the Sacraments, for example, focuses on how Christ's whole life was a ministry of healing and the fundamental source of all Sacraments.

Pitfalls of Christianity is Father latest book covering Henry's misunderstandings of the Bible (especially the Old Testament), prayer, and Christianity in the world today.

Every Christian has probably had some doubts about God, His goodness, or Christianity at some point in their journey. Some of us



brush those aside doubts but struggle with them throughout our whole lives. Some of us think that doubts are wrong, and а stronger faith is needed.

But God is the source of both faith and reason, and there is no contradiction in God. In fact, both faith and reason lead us to the one Truth who is God.

'Pitfalls of Christianity' is that one important book we can refer to, to make sense of the doubts and questions we have about God and our faith. Even better, Father Henry has written the book in such a simple, straightforward manner that it helps with understanding.

The librarians were blessed to have met Father Henry and hear him passionately share about his books and why he wrote them. May the Holy Spirit bless all efforts to bring Christ's teaching and healing contained in these books to anyone who reads it.
