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Like Christ – Forgive Infinitely

24th Sunday in Ordinary Time 17 Sep 2023

Sir 27:30-28-7 Rom 14:7-9 Mt 18:21-35

In today's Gospel, Peter asks the Lord how often one must forgive. Our Lord tells him to forgive infinitely and uses the famous parable to remind him of where the source of all forgiveness comes.

Forgiving all degrees of hurts, no matter who the perpetrator, no matter how often, is a tough and often impossible act to follow. Only God is able to do this. The teaching here, however, is that we are to follow this tough act to the end, because that is what God unceasingly offers us in our repentance, and because it would be an eternally regrettable mistake if we don't. The parable of the unforgiving servant is about us. We have accrued so much sin, we could never pay off the debt of our sins. But God forgives us through Jesus when we ask for mercy. Yet we hang on to petty anger and grudges towards others.

The sum the first servant owed is so monumental that forgiveness becomes a matter of trust on the part of the master. That is how God is with us. But we squander that trust when we in turn do not forgive others.

In the Our Father, when we pray "forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us", we are also implicitly agreeing to the inverse - that if we do not forgive others, God will also not forgive us. It is when our hearts are closed to

forgiving others, that it is also closed to God's mercy. That is why God's forgiveness cannot reach us. When we are unable to forgive others, we shackle ourselves in a spiritual debtor's prison, from which we will never emerge, unless we learn to forgive. That is what hell is.

Dying on the cross, Jesus' mercy overflowed, but our hearts often refuse even a drop of mercy for others who hurt us. This is precisely what the Lord is comparing when he cites the example of 10,000 talents versus 100 denarii owed, as well as the respective forgiveness and vengeance exacted.

This world demands justice for wrongdoings, but the kingdom of God, where we belong, expects something purer from us in the form of mercy. As citizens of God's kingdom, we must behave in a way that authentically reflects who we are – children set apart for him and created after his image and likeness.

Jesus' words in the Gospel echo Sirach's in the first reading, which urges the reader not to be angry, but to leave vengeance to God, so that God will be merciful to us too. Indeed, Jesus didn't come to abolish Old Testament teaching, but to fulfil it.

Psalm 102 exults that it is when we imitate God in forgiveness and kindness, when we are slow to anger and abounding in mercy, that we are like him, because God chooses to be revealed in his mercy, not power and majesty.


St Paul says that we live and die for Christ. He is our King in Heaven, on earth and under the earth. It is to Christ's monarchy that we belong, not the temporal democracy we live in. So, when we disavow ourselves of the King's commands to live for others as

he does, we can expect to be cast out of his kingdom.

We will never come close to God's level of mercy. But having experienced the lavish mercy of God, we should be quick to forgive others, so as to be God-like, since forgiveness is a divine attribute.

"For us Christians it is an imperative from which we cannot excuse ourselves. At times how hard it seems to forgive! And yet pardon is the instrument placed into our fragile hands to attain serenity of heart. To let go of anger, wrath, violence, and revenge are necessary conditions to living joyfully." (Pope Francis, *The Face of Mercy*)

In the Sacrament of Reconciliation, forgiveness turns the bitterness of sin into grace. In the depths of our hearts, if we can offer the hurt we remember to the Holy Spirit, he can turn it into intercession and blessing. We don't have to like our transgressors, but we ought to love and pray for them. Prayer is a work of mercy, and love is willing the good of another. (cf CCC 2843)

RCIY RETREAT

"Zacchaeus, Come Down From that Tree"

Over a recent weekend, 15 youths attended their first RCIY retreat held on SFX parish grounds. Based on the gospel account of the meeting of Zacchaeus with Jesus, the youth were introduced to the significance of our personal identity as children of God, and invited to respond to the Lord's invitation to have a relationship with Him.

Through a series of presentations, reflections, prayer, para-liturgies, small group sharings, praise and worship, the inquirers explored various themes in the story. They were introduced to Jesus and His heart of compassion and love for all, especially those rejected by society. The youth recognized how, like Zacchaeus, they are often given labels and led to believe that they are not good enough or worthy of God's love. The sessions focused on opening the inquirers' hearts to a deeper awareness of their true identity as precious sons and daughters of God and the truth that they are loved deeply and unconditionally for who they are, regardless of their past or present circumstances.



It was beautiful to witness the softening of hearts and heartening to hear their testimonies at the closing of the camp. Here are some testimonies:

I have recently been questioning if I really wish to be confirmed next year as I didn't feel much of a connection with God. This camp made me realise I do want to stay in this church for a very long time ... and yes, I want to be confirmed! I still don't quite trust or love God as fully as I should - but I am definitely on my way there!! - Kayla, 15

There are friends out here for me that I didn't even realise. God is saying to me – "Live. Laugh. Love!" The camp has been a good adventure – being by myself is not as fun as being with others. I see great things happening from small beginnings. - Nathanael, 18

I have had some previous exposure to Christianity but got a bit lost – felt maybe it wasn't what I wanted. This weekend has allowed me to search my heart again and the answer is a small 'yes' to continuing – a slow but good start to resuming the journey of seeking God. - En Lih, 22





Some participants who had arrived on Friday evening feeling anxious, distracted by personal issues, or laden with expectations of a boring and heavy, 'prayer intensive' weekend were thankful in the end that they had come. In the words of one, "I felt relief when I stepped into church;" another decided to shift her attention to 'just being with God' while a third said 'the door of (my) heart opened and I let Jesus in.'

We give God our grateful thanks for everything He has done for our young inquirers and to members of 1Cor12 who came and led us in praise and worship. We are grateful also to the intercessory teams and parishioners for their prayer support that carried us this far. The BAT Ministry

St Jerome famously stated that "Ignorance of Scripture is ignorance of Christ." Therefore what can Catholics do to try and understand scripture better and not stay ignorant? Join our talks and courses organised by the BAT Ministry and open your eyes and heart to what our Lord wants to teach you.

Our **BAT** (**Biblical Apostolate Team**) in SFX offers several programmes during the year, so that the faithful may better pray with, share and live the Word of God, and witness to the Gospel. We strive to cultivate a personal encounter with Christ through some of these activities.

Due to the Covid-19 situation, many BAT programmes had to switch to online platforms. Though meeting online is not as conducive for forming community, there were advantages especially for those with limited mobility or limited time due to family or work commitments. As such, for the year 2023, BAT decided to offer a hybrid programme of both online and face-to-face programmes.

Some of the talks that were organised this year were on:

- A Biblical Walk Through Christ's Passion, a Lenten Journey in 5 sessions
- Why Catholics Believe What We Believe, 8 sessions or Catholic Apologetics

Both of these were held in-person on Sunday mornings.

The series of 8 talks on Catholic Apologetics was organised with the objective of helping Catholics to answer common objections to Catholic beliefs and practices. As such, questions that were raised were "tackled" or answered by some BAT members. Sharing these questions and answers with course participants enabled the community to learn in greater depth.

The **Great Adventure Bible Timeline**, an online bible study programme with a few in-person sessions is also ongoing at the moment. Most of the sessions for this course are held online **every Wed** evening from **8pm to 9.30pm**.

To close off the year, there will be a 5-session talk on A Catholic View of the End Times, starting soon on 17 Sep, to be held in St Jeremiah Room in SFX from 9am to 10.30am.
