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Dressing Right for the Wedding Feast

28th Sunday in Ordinary Time 15 Oct 2023

Is 25:6-10A Phil 4:12-14, 19-20 Mt 22:1-14 or 22:1-10

Today's scripture readings are centred around God's plan to rescue and welcome us into the kingdom of heaven. The First reading from Isaiah presents a picture of a loving Father who goes out to provide a rich feast of food and wine for his people, to free them from their pain and hardships and show that he is the one true God who comes to redeem them.

Jesus in today's Gospel of Matthew, likens the "kingdom of heaven" to "a king that gave a wedding feast for his son". This is an invitation from the King who is God the Father himself to us to partake in the abundance and celebration of love and communion with his only son Jesus.

It is also a sobering reminder that we have a choice in accepting the Father's invitation to join in the heavenly celebration. As the parable goes, the first invited guests (some liken them to be synonymous with the early believers) refused to go because they had other more pressing matters on the "farm" and "business" that is of the world. Those men had accepted the invitation but then decided that it meant nothing to them: they were self-sufficient; they had no desire to change or to allow the Lord to change them.


As is often the case, worldly concerns and pursuits can push out God's call.

But God does not stop at those who refuse or reject him. It is a choice both theirs and ours. God moves on because he has a plan for the inclusion of all peoples and all nations and not just with the first guests. Like the King pronounced, "the feast is ready, but those who were invited were not worthy to come. Go out, therefore into the main roads and invite to the feast whomever you find ... and they found, bad and good alike".

As we will see, this invitation is not carte blanche. In fact this wedding feast is like no other because it demands that we come dressed "right" in a "wedding garment"-because anything less than that will see the King casting the "guest" out into the "darkness outside where there will be wailing and grinding of teeth" to a place of eternal separation from God.

What are we to make of this "wedding garment"? Here it signifies the disposition a person needs for entering the Kingdom of heaven. Even though we may belong to the Church, if we do not have these dispositions we will be condemned on the day when God judges all mankind. The wedding garment is righteousness that the grace and mercy that God freely gives us that allows us to take a step forward in Christian life. Everything is grace but we need to act on our faith.

This is tantamount to saying that believing and having faith is necessary but not enough. To be saved and enter into the heavenly banquet, we need both faith and good works. Therefore, accepting God's grace means opening our lives to a journey of conversion, which changes the heart and dispositions. We respond and allow God's grace to



work in and through us to perform the works that bear out our faith.

Allowing for God's grace to work through us, Pope Francis in his Angelus Address on 11 October 2020, calls the Church to go beyond those we can "see" to the "peripheries of humanity, those places at the margins where "remnants of humanity live". It is the call to open the doors of our hearts and our communities to everyone, because the Gospel is not reserved to a select few. Even those on the margins, those who are rejected and scorned by society, are considered by God to be worthy of his love. He prepares his banquet for everyone: the saints and sinners, good and bad, the rich and the poor.

God in his infinite wisdom gives man free choice and respects his freedom. Our cooperation with God's grace can lead us "to do all things in him who strengthens me" (Phil 4:13). St. Paul assures us that "God will fully supply every need of ours according to his riches in glory in Christ Jesus" (Phil 4:19) so that while "many are called" we may work to be among the "few (who) are chosen".

GETTING TO KNOW...

We are fortunate in SFX that we have many parishioners in our ministries who help our church in various ways. While some deal with the formation aspects eg BAT (Bible Apostolate Team) and LiFE (Living in The Faith Everyday), other ministries help with the liturgical (Altar Servers and Choirs) and outreach areas. There are some informal groups that help the church in flower arrangements, cleaning and other areas.

This week, we focus on two ministries that play a big part in helping our priests every week during the liturgy - the **Wardens** and the **Communion Ministers (CMs)**.



The Wardens Ministry

Our wardens help to ensure the smooth flow of traffic into and out of church. They usher parishioners to empty seats, do the collection of offertory during masses and generally serve the church by keeping order, peace and tranquility

for worship in Church.

The ministry's most senior warden is Anthony who is 87 years young and when asked why he is with the ministry, his simple answer was that he just wanted to serve God. And how else to serve God than by serving His people? Anthony also shared that he became a more devout Catholic after being a warden and that he had received many countless blessings, without even realising it.





Shawn, 31 years old, is the youngest warden and when asked why he joined the ministry, he said, "I grew up in SFX and joined the ministry as part of my catechetical attachment at the age of 15. The attachment was meant to last for 4 weeks but the experiences and fellowship that I shared with everyone, and the calling to humbly serve the parishioners has led me to serve for the last 16 years."

For Shawn, this ministry gave him the opportunity to give back to the community. Simple greetings and small acts of kindness bring a smile to everyone and that's one good experience that resonates with him. Besides the close bonds with the other wardens and their families, Shawn has had the honour to serve the wider Catholic community through major events such as the Lourdes Experience and the Archbishop's Episcopal Ordination. He added, "I was proud to have been a part of them."



The Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion

The Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion or commonly known as Communion Ministers (CMs) are appointed by the Parish Priest and commissioned to assist the priests to distribute Holy Communion during Mass and bring the Holy Eucharist to the sick or homebound parishioners.

One of the oldest CMs would be Patrick Ee, who has been helping in this role for the last 25 years. Patrick is also involved in RCIA and the St Pio prayer group and was in the church building committee for many years. During SFX's 50th anniversary, Patrick was awarded the long service award for having served 25 years in church.

Lionel Tan has been a CM for 2 years and for him, it has been a blessing that he has been able to partake in and be a part of Jesus' own giving of His self in the Eucharist. As Lionel gives Jesus to each person, he is reminded of the primacy of the Eucharist and also how Jesus is present and the source of each life.





The Proper Attire Inside a Church

What is proper attire to wear to church? And especially in our hot and humid weather in Singapore, do we really need to be in long sleeves or fancy gowns? While it is difficult to suggest what would be a correct dress code, most would agree that certain items of clothing would be inappropriate e.g. singlets, shorts, string or spaghetti tops, low cut tops, miniskirts, very tight or see-through clothes.

Here is what the Catechism of the Catholic Church has to say about dressing properly for Mass: "To prepare for worthy reception of this sacrament, the faithful should observe the fast required in their Church. Bodily demeanor (gestures, clothing) ought to convey the respect, solemnity, and joy of this moment when Christ becomes our guest." – CCC 1387.

So while you get your OOTD (outfit of the day) ready each day, spare a thought for your OOTD for church. Check the inforgraphic below for what's proper and improper attire in keeping with our dignity as baptised children of God.

The sacrament can be administered to any Catholic awaiting serious surgery, suffering from serious illness or weakened by old age. INFANT BAPTISM

Spiritual preparation is held on the last Friday of every odd month. Baptism is held on the first/second Sunday of the following month. For registration, please refer to our website.

FUNERAL

Please check with the Parish Office for priest availability and Mass timing before confirming the timing at the crematorium. For prayers at the wake, please contact the Parish Office.

MARRIAGE

Contact the Parish Office
12 months before your intended date to book the church premises and ensure that your presiding priest is able to make that date.

MASS OFFERING

Mass offering envelopes are available outside the Parish Office and outside JPII Hall. Submit your envelopes at least two weeks in advance of your intended date. Please write the names clearly, and in block letters.
