Even Caesar Belongs to God

29th Sunday in Ordinary Time 22 Oct 2023

Is 45:1, 4-6 1 Th 1:1-5 Mt 22:15-21

In this Sunday's Gospel reading, the Pharisees attempt to entrap Jesus by asking him: "Is it permissible to pay taxes to Caesar or not?"

In Jesus' time, Rome's taxation of Judaea was politically and religiously controversial.

On one hand, Jewish zealots who were keen to expel the Roman Empire from the Holy Land argued that taxation was a form of Roman enslavement. Such narratives had been even used to incite the people of Judaea to violent rebellions.

On the other hand, the Herodians supported Herod, who had been put on the throne by the Romans. Accordingly, they supported, at least implicitly, Roman rule.

Herein would be Jesus' "dilemma" - the trap the Pharisees thought they had so cleverly set up. If he answered "yes", he could be criticised for impiety – denying the sovereignty of God's holy nation and people. But if he answered "no", he could be arrested for sedition – inciting rebellion against Rome.

Jesus' brilliant response draws the distinction between State and Church: "Give back to Caesar what belongs to Caesar, and to God what belongs to God" (Mt 22:21). At a time when both Roman and Jewish leaders equated spiritual with political authority, Jesus cut the Gordian knot linking the kingdoms of God and men.

This is a common theme throughout Jesus' ministry. From his parables to his miracles, and eventually at his trial before Pontius Pilate, Jesus' consistent message was that "[his] kingdom is not of this world" (Jn 18:36). Even while he was condemned by religious leaders and crucified by political ones, he remained the King of the Jews. In this regard, St Augustine of Hippo wrote that Jesus was "the only-begotten" and yet "he paid the reckoning (of his body), the tribute to Caesar".


What does this distinction between Church and State mean for Christians? How does it implicate the way we carry out our daily work, how we deal with political authority, or even how we vote?

Theologians, politicians, and historians do not fully agree on answers to such complex questions. But we can converge on some principles.

<u>First</u>, *distinction* is not *mutual exclusion*.

As Bishop Robert Barron puts it, "Though there is a legitimate distinction between [the religious and political spheres], this can never turn into a separation. We should certainly render to Caesar what is Caesar's but we must never forget that even Caesar belongs to God."

St Paul affirms this (Rom 13:1): "For there is no authority except from God, and those that exist have been instituted by God."



The <u>second</u> principle, then, is we should *generally* respect worldly authority.

CCC1900 states that we are required to "give due honour to authority and to treat those who are charged to exercise it with respect, and insofar as it is deserved, with gratitude and goodwill." In this regard, we consider these authorities "as representatives of God, who has made them stewards of his gifts." (CCC2238)

Accordingly, we are "morally [obliged] to pay taxes, to exercise the right to vote, and to defend one's country." (CCC2240)

The <u>third</u> corollary principle is that worldly authority has limits, and is subject to divine authority and the natural law.

In other words, authorities must act for the common good (CCC1902), employ morally acceptable means (CCC1921), practice distributive justice with a view to harmony and peace (CCC2236), and respect the fundamental rights of the human person (CCC2237).

If authority is exercised illegitimately, Jesus' injunction to render to God what belongs to God takes precedence. We are therefore "obliged in conscience not to follow the directives of civil authorities when they are contrary to the demands of the moral order, to the fundamental rights of persons, or the teachings of the Gospel." (CCC2242) Or in Peter's words, "We must obey God rather than men." (Ac 5:29)

As we celebrate World Mission Sunday, we pray for and with missionaries who are spreading the gospel in all parts of the world. Our Sunday gospel text is especially relevant for such brothers and sisters who have given their lives to build God's kingdom in alien lands which are sometimes ruled by hostile governments. May we all remember that the work we do is in service of the one true sovereign, Christ the King.



World Mission Sunday



In 1926, Pope Pius XI instituted Mission Sunday for the whole Church with the first worldwide Mission Sunday collection taking place in October 1927.

Mission Sunday is always on the next to last Sunday during the month of October. It is a day set aside for the Catholic Church throughout the world to publicly renew its commitment to the missionary movement. Throughout the world the faithful will reflect on the universal call to Mission of all the baptised. They are invited to be specifically conscious of the Church's missionary activity abroad through prayer, sacrifice and financial contributions.

The funds collected in all churches throughout the world on Mission Sunday is coordinated by the Society for the Propagation of the Faith, founded by Pauline Jaricot under the umbrella of Pontifical Mission Societies. The funds are used to assist churches who need financial support and directed towards communities in need, both spiritually and materially.

Pope Francis, in his message for World Mission Sunday 2023, reflects on the theme "Hearts on fire, feet on the move," based on

the story of the disciples who encounter Jesus on their way to Emmaus (cf. Lk 24:13-35). He invites all of us to "set out once more, illumined by our encounter with the risen Lord and prompted by his Spirit. Let us set out again with burning hearts, with our eyes open and our feet in motion. Let us set out to make other hearts burn with the word of God, to open the eyes of others to Jesus in the Eucharist, and to invite everyone to walk together on the path of peace and salvation that God, in Christ, has bestowed upon all humanity."

On World Mission Sunday, we join our Holy Father in supporting his missions. As we pray and respond here at home, we share in those celebrations taking place in every parish and school throughout the world. Together, through our prayers and financial support, we bring the Lord's mercy and concrete help to the most vulnerable communities in the Pope's missions.


