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# Do We Really Desire Heaven?

30<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time 29 Oct 2023

Ex 22:20-26 1 Th 1:5-10 Mt 22:34-40

Talk is cheap.

Jesus warns that the false piety of the hypocritical scribes and pharisees are unworthy of imitation: "for they preach, but do not practice" (cf Mt 23:1-3).

While the scribes and the pharisees advocate complicated laws to flatter themselves, Jesus simplifies 613 commands of the Mosaic Law into love of God (Deut 6:5) and love of neighbour (Lv 19:18). Christcentred love replaces Christ-less law keeping, grace replaces legalism.

Most cultures have a golden rule to be a good person: "Do not do to others what you would not do to yourself".

This is diluted Christian love. Avoidance lulls us to inaction and complacency. It is actually selfish.

In contrast, Jesus' answer turns away from self to God and neighbour - it is selfless and life-giving. We see it in the caregiving of a mother to her helpless infant, of adult children to their aging parents.

Christian love is beyond familial love and reciprocation of kindness, both of which are rooted in human nature. The challenge: How can we love strangers? How can we love God whom we cannot see?

In *Deus Caritas Est* (God is love) #18, Pope Benedict XVI explains that through Christ, love is no longer a command but a response; it is the encounter with God's love that enables us to love our neighbour

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in return. Then, we can "love even the person whom [we] do not like or know" because love has been transformed beyond "feelings" and "exterior appearances".

We see this in the 1st Reading. God tells Moses - the Jews are to help everyone in need, especially foreigners, widows and orphans. The Jews first encountered God's love when they were slaves in Egypt (Ex 22:21-22). This enables them to respond in love to those in need. To love God is to obey his commands (cf 1 Jn 5:3). So loving our neighbour is loving God.

Charity is love in action. Love as a social principle favours the vulnerable, as love presumes justice. Acts of charity redistribute wealth and restore justice. A person in need is entitled to dignity and self-esteem. God created us in his image. He also created the world with the capacity to satisfy human needs. It means everyone has the right to resources necessary for full development. Anyone in need must not be despised, exploited, humiliated, ignored.

In giving, we must not act or feel superior to the needy since we are only stewards of God's creation. It is also not our business to judge people's predicament. Saint Teresa of Calcutta says that when we judge, we stop loving.

Pope Benedict XVI teaches that love of God and neighbour are intertwined and inseparable. He cautions that if we do not see the image of God in others, acts of charity born out of devotion and duties are "proper" but loveless; our relationship with God will



likewise grow arid and stale (cf *Deus Caritas Est*, #18).

To grow in love is to grow in holiness. The holier we are, the more sociable we become since love is relational by nature. How should we practice love in communities?

- Love without truth is sentimentality (cf *DCE* #3). Suppressing unpleasant truths in relationships is not authentic love. Trading and thriving only on niceties and pleasantries lead to "inbreeding" relationships tend to be shallow, fragile, sterile, disordered. Much like networking in a business context, such friendship becomes utilitarian and lack enduring solidarity and brotherhood.
- Fraternal correction must never be censorial but steeped in mercy, peace and purity of intention. Emotion and affectation sow discord and division. Justice without love is harsh. (cf *Angelus*, 4 Sep 2011)

Is our love strong or stale? Since love leads to heaven, the degree of our desire for heaven indicates the quality of our love. If the thought of heaven is mundane, if worshipping God in the beatific vision is perceived to be boring, then, heaven and God are mere extensions of entertainment. Such thoughts betray our addiction to earthly pleasures, attachment to the world and to life itself. Our love for God and neighbour becomes questionable, but God's love for us remains steadfast.

# Parish Recollection 2023
