Liberated by Grace

Making Disciples

2nd Sunday of Advent 10 Dec 2023

Is 40:1-5, 9-11 2 Pt 3:8-14 Mk 1:1-8

The season of Advent invites us to an openness to God as we prepare for Christmas, the historical moment when the Christ was born to dwell among us and renew us from within.

In last Sunday's readings, we were given a message of hope to trust in the power of "the gifts of the Spirit" (1 Cor 1:7). We were encouraged to fix our gaze on the ultimate horizon at the end of time when our Lord Jesus Christ will return and be fully revealed in his glory.

On this Second Sunday of Advent, we hear from Second Isaiah, whose theology centres on "a new exodus". Second Isaiah announced a liberation for the Israelites who were suffering from decades of bitter exile in Babylon, "Comfort, comfort my people...Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and cry to her that her warfare is ended." (Is 40:1-2)

Though Isaiah's prophecy seemed to have been immediately fulfilled in the year 539 B.C. when the Jews were finally liberated from captivity, it more profoundly anticipated a type of liberation that would be accomplished with the coming of Jesus.

There is no other place in the whole of scripture in which the words of Isaiah about the "voice of one crying out in the desert: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths," was fulfilled — except with John the Baptist, the forerunner of Christ.

Not only did Isaiah then foretell the identity of Jesus as the promised

liberator, but his prophecy becomes an invitation to all of us, to the new Israel, the people of the new covenant, to prepare to embrace the only true and lasting liberation which Jesus came to save us from — that which is from the bondage of sin.

It is because of this deeper meaning of Isaiah's words that this reading has been chosen for Advent, and is well summarised in a quote by Theodoret of Cyr, an early church father from 393-466 A.D:

"The true consolation, the genuine comfort and the real deliverance from the iniquities of humankind is the incarnation of our God and Saviour." (Commentary on Isaiah)

How can this message today reverberate and touch a world crippled by moral and material slavery, worn out by poverty and hunger, by sickness and disease, and all who are suffering from grave and systematic injustice?

Pope Benedict XVI asserts that Jesus, through His death and resurrection, had "inaugurated an exodus that was no longer solely earthly, simply situated in history and therefore temporary" (7 Dec 2008, Angelus). Rather, Jesus' liberation was one that was "definitive". It granted to all men "the transition from the kingdom of evil to the Kingdom of God, from the dominion of sin and death to that of love and life". This extended human hope "beyond the legitimate expectations of social and political liberation because what Jesus began is a new humanity that comes 'from God' but, at the same time, germinates on our earth, to the extent that it lets itself be fertilized by the Lord's Spirit".

He went on to say that while this universal perspective guides the Church and her faith today, a belief in God, in His plan of salvation and at the same time, striving to build His Kingdom as we "make straight in the desert a highway for our God." (Is 40:3) are tasks for us. While justice and peace are "gifts of God", we are required to be "the 'good ground' ready to receive the good seed of His Word and walk toward the 'new heavens and a new earth in which righteousness dwells' (2 Pt 3:13)".

So let us celebrate Advent as a devout and joyful anticipation and readiness for Christ's final coming. Jesus has not only come in history and will come again in the future in glory. Let us also be grateful that he continues to come into us in our daily Eucharist.

As we move another week towards Christmas, let us clear a path for God's grace and make our hearts a new Bethlehem. Let us pray for the grace to have an inner transformation that leads to a renewed relationship with the Lord.



ST JEROME LIBRARY

The "Straits of Singapore", as signed off in St Francis Xavier's letters was Francis' last stop before he arrived on Sancian Island, China, at the end of August 1552. Francis wrote five letters dated between 20 July and 1 August, 1552 from the Straits.

These letters addressed mainly his missionary hopes for China and his concern for the Christian communities established in Japan and the Moluccas



(Indonesia). He asked that any missionary to Japan should be "learned and well read...some clever man able to learn the Japanese language" while a missionary to the Moluccas should be "a man well furnished not so much with learning as with virtue; for in the Moluccas goodness of life is required more than learning" (20 July, 1552).

In this first letter from the Straits of Singapore addressed to the Rector of the Jesuit College in Goa, he also asked for the formal excommunication for Don Alvaro (son of the famous Portuguese explorer, Vasco da Gama) as he had tried to stop Francis' mission to China out of personal jealousy. Francis saw formal excommunication for those who obstruct the spread of the faith as needed for their salvation - to "bring them to themselves, and lead them to seek a remedy for the wounds of their souls".

The five letters are now mounted up at St Jerome Library. Come by and get a glimpse of the zeal and personal concern of St Francis Xavier for those involved in his missionary work, especially for "John the Japanese". St Jerome Library is open Sundays 8am - 1pm. For this weekend, the Library will also be open after the evening Masses.

Those who wanted to know more about St Francis Xavier were able to browse and read through an amazing exhibition showcasing his life, visionary work and the









countries he visited during his missionary endeavours. There was even a real life (stuffed) specimen of the crucifix crab.
