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God Knows our Sufferings

5th Sunday in Ordinary Time 05 Feb 2024

Job 7:1-4, 6-7 1 Cor 9:16-19, 22-23 Mk 1:29-39

Job's lament in today's first reading is heart-wrenching. He had lost all his property (Job 1:14-17); his children were killed in a disaster (Job 1:19); he was struck down with a severe skin disease (Job 2:7); his wife urged him to forget God, "...Curse God and die!" (Job 2:9) and his three "friends" speculated over his secret sins rather than console him and give him hope (Job 4 – 33). Maintaining his innocence, Job cries out in despair over his emptiness, "life is nothing more than pressed service...hired drudgery..." and resigns himself in hopelessness that he would never again have joy (Job 7:1,7).

When things take a turn for the worse with no sight of a return to normality, we are often on an emotional roller-coaster like Job, vacillating between some faith in one moment (perhaps hoping to win God's speedy intervention -cf Job 2:10), and doubting God's presence in the next (cf Job 7:1-4).

Today's gospel is a source of hope when we encounter suffering according to Pope Benedict XVI. Jesus healed Peter's mother-in-law immediately and spent the evening curing the sick and exorcising devils from those who had been possessed (cf Mk 1: 31-34). All of Jesus' healings and exorcisms were important signs that God has heard the cry of human suffering and has established his kingdom here on earth in the church so that his healing and

restoration can be accessible to all:


"Jesus' entire mission is symbolically portrayed in this episode. Jesus, coming from the Father, visited peoples' homes on our earth and found a humanity that was sick, sick with fever, the fever of ideologies, idolatry, forgetfulness of God. The Lord gives us his hand, lifts us up and heals us. And he does so in all ages; he takes us by the hand with his Word, thereby dispelling the fog of ideologies and forms of idolatry. He takes us by the hand in the sacraments, he heals us from the fever of our passions and sins through absolution in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. He gives us the possibility to raise ourselves ... [in the] Sunday liturgy, the Lord comes to meet us, he ... heals us ever anew with the gift of his words, the gift of himself." (Homily, 5 February 2006)

Like Job, we may be in such despair that there is a "forgetfulness" of God's love for us. Like Job's wife, we may be practicing idolatry, worshipping the things from God rather than God himself, such that when these things are gone, we begrudge God for their loss. We may be like Job's so-called "friends" with our own "foggy" self-created ideologies about God that we pass off as divine inspiration. God warns against such "prophets" of hopelessness asking, "Who is this who darkens counsel with words of ignorance?" (Job 38:2)

God's true nature and his compassion for us can be known by looking at Jesus' self-offering on the cross for our salvation for "[o]nly a God who loves us to the extent of taking upon himself our wounds and our pain, especially innocent suffering, is worthy of faith... God... wanted to suffer for us and with us; He became man so that He could *suffer with* man, in a real way, in flesh and blood. To every human suffering,

therefore, there has entered One who shares suffering and endurance..." (Pope Benedict XVI, Message, 19th World Day of the Sick, 21 Nov 2010)

As we look upon the crucifix, we can be reassured once more that God will come to our aid and we must persevere in believing in his love for us. Having already received God's restoration to wholeness in our baptism, we are also reminded today to continue sustaining this new life by participating in God's mission of hope. Just as Peter's mother-in-law "began to wait on them" (Mk 1:31) after Jesus "helped her up" and St Paul was prepared to be "the slave of everyone" (1 Cor 9:19) so as to make God's mercy in Christ known to as many as possible, let us also be ready to do and to be whatever God calls us to. May our transformed lives and our words reflect the "good news" (1 Cor 9:18) we have so blessedly received from Christ.

The Year of Prayer



In preparation for the 2025 Jubilee Year "Pilgrims of Hope", 2024 has been designated a *Year of Prayer*.

On Sunday 21 January, on the fifth annual celebration of the 'Sunday of the Word of God', the Holy Father Pope Francis officially opened the *Year of Prayer* during the recitation of the Angelus.

The Holy Father has asked that 2024 be a year of prayer, as a preparatory year for the Jubilee, and called on the faithful "to pray more fervently to prepare ourselves to live properly this grace-filled event and to experience the power of hope in God."

The Year of Prayer, the Holy Father explained, is dedicated "to rediscovering the great value and absolute need for prayer, prayer in personal life, in the life of the Church, prayer in the world."

Rediscovering our need for daily prayer

The Year of Prayer, noted by Archbishop Rino Fisichella, Pro-Prefect of the Dicastery for Evangelisation, "is not a Year marked with particular initiatives; rather, it is a privileged time in which to rediscover the value of prayer and the need for daily prayer in our Christian life."

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The Year, he said, is "a time to discover how to pray and, above all, how to educate the people of today in prayer, in this age of digital culture, so that prayer can be effective and fruitful."

2025 - The Year of the Jubilee



The Jubilee has always been an event of great spiritual, ecclesial, and social significance in the life of the Church. Ever since 1300, when Pope Boniface VIII instituted the first Holy Year – initially celebrated every hundred years, then, following its biblical precedent, every fifty years, and finally every twenty-five years – God's holy and faithful people has experienced this celebration as a special gift of grace, characterised

by the forgiveness of sins and in particular by the indulgence, which is a full expression of the mercy of God.


To you our God, eternally blessed, be glory and praise for ever.

As we begin the Year of Prayer as a preparation for the Jubilee Year in 2025, let us make time for prayer in our busy lives.



THE TRADITION OF CATHOLIC PRAYER

Catholics have a rich and ancient prayer tradition. We have private devotions or participate as a community in the Liturgy of the Hours. We also go on pilgrimages and have altars in our homes. In this book, the monks of Saint Meinrad recount the tradition of Catholic prayer chronologically. The central chapters look at prayer in the contexts of the Mass, the Liturgical Year, and the Liturgy of the Hours. Final chapters lead us to a deeper understanding of the Catholic imagination and the place of prayer in the lives of the faithful.



PRAYER FOR BEGINNERS

This book is for those who acknowledge their need to improve their prayer life. Philosopher and Catholic convert, Peter Kreeft, gives simple, but profound advice and practical steps for growing a prayer life based on the wisdom of the saints and the great spiritual writers. His book can help us develop that intimate communication with our Creator that we call prayer.



ST. AUGUSTINE ANSWERS 101 QUESTIONS **ON PRAYER**

How do I know God hears my prayers? How can I 'pray always, ' as Jesus commands? Why must I ask for things God already knows I need?

Such questions perplexed St Augustine (354-430), whose intense yearning for God led him into a profound and lifelong encounter with Christ in prayer. Augustine found answers to these questions not from his own brilliance, but in the practice of prayer itself. His words are as relevant to us today as they were to his contemporaries in the 4th - 5th centuries.
