## Chosen and Loved

2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time  
19 Jan 2025

Is 62:1-5  
1 Cor 12:4-11  
Jn 2:1-11

As we begin this season of Ordinary Time, we are drawn into the public ministry of Jesus – beginning with the first miracle of the wedding at Cana. The familiarity of this story may lead us to assume that it is only about marriage, but it is much more than that.

Apart from being the first miracle performed by Jesus, “[t]he Church attaches great importance to Jesus’ presence at the wedding at Cana. She sees in it the confirmation of the goodness of marriage and the proclamation that thenceforth marriage will be an efficacious sign of Christ’s presence” (CCC 1613). As a sign of God’s presence, we can pay close attention to St John’s commentary at the end of today’s gospel: “He let his glory be seen, and his disciples believed in him” (Jn 2:11). In the Gospel narrative, everyone plays a role in the wedding, from the bride and bridegroom, to Mary, Jesus and his disciples, and the servants. But regardless of their role, they are brought together to be a part of and bear witness to God’s works. This echoes what is said in *Lumen Gentium*: “Rather has it pleased him to bring men together as one people, a people which acknowledges him in truth and serves him in holiness” (LG 9).

The call to serve is tied to what we are blessed with. In the second

reading, St Paul shares that God gives a variety of gifts that work in “all sorts of different ways in different people” (1 Cor 12:6). Be it at home, in the workplace or the parish, we are blessed with charisms for the roles we play. But these charisms are not gifts that we have developed by our own strength, but rather gifts that were given to us by God, and we are chosen and loved for each different gift. At times we may feel envious of the gifts of others, but we are called to remember that “the particular way in which the Spirit is given to each person is for a good person” (1 Cor 12:7). We are called to use these gifts not for our own glory, but for the glory of God.

These gifts draw us into the matrimonial imagery presented in the Gospel and first reading. The wedding at Cana can be viewed as a microcosm of God’s desire for us. “[The] mutual love [of spouses] becomes an image of the absolute and unfailing love with which God loves man” (cf. CCC 1604). With God as the bridegroom and us, the Church, his bride, we come with our different gifts to bear witness to how much God loves us. The shortage of wine at the wedding in Cana is an opportunity for God’s glory to be shown. In our lives, are

we sensitive to the opportunities for God’s glory to be shown? This call is emphasised in the two options of the Gospel acclamation: “Speak, Lord, your servant is listening: you have the message of eternal life” (1 Sam 3:9; Jn 6:68) or: “Through the Good News God called us to share the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ” (2 Th 2:14). When we recognise that we are chosen and loved by God, we take on the identities that God gives us.

The first reading from the prophet Isaiah shows that God has chosen us for a personal intimate relationship through matrimonial imageries. As the prophet tells us: “[N]o longer are you to be named ‘Forsaken’, nor your land ‘Abandoned’, but you shall be called ‘My Delight’ and your land ‘The Wedded’” (Is 62:4). The names that speak of rejection and distance from God and others would be replaced by names of belonging and union with God. To be chosen is a calling to be set apart, and we are set apart by the Lord to be his.

As we begin another season of Ordinary Time, let us return to this often-forgotten reminder: that God chooses us and loves us, and we are called to choose God and love him.




