Making Disciples**

**The Enemy
Within**

7th Sunday in Ordinary Time
23 Feb 2025

1 Sam 26:2, 7-9, 12-13, 22-23
1 Cor 15:45-49
Lk 6:27-38

Today's readings have a lot to teach us about managing difficult relationships and trying situations.

In the sermon on the plain, Jesus articulates the values of the Kingdom of God. Love for enemies, mercy and forgiveness, the nature of true righteousness, judgment and generosity – these Christian paradigms shift attention away from blaming others. They challenge our inclination to retaliate or harbour resentment, to see love as a choice rather than an emotional response.

Is it plausible to love our enemies, do good to those who hate us, and pray for those who mistreat us (cf. Lk 6:27-28)?

The 1st Reading shows it is possible even in matters of life and death. In a relationship gone sour, David incredibly spares Saul's life despite Saul's determination to kill him. David's refusal to take vengeance reflects a deep understanding and trust in God's authority, and the call to forgive even those who seek to harm us (cf. 1 Sam 26:9-11).

In life, we sometimes find ourselves in similar situations. When we are wronged, the sense of injustice and hurt can fuel rage and revenge. We are tempted to take justice into our own hands, a mis-justification and misnomer for rectifying wrongs.

But true justice has to be deeply rooted in love and forgiveness. Righteousness is not merely following the rule of law or

seeking redress. Doing so without compassion makes us treasure money, power, expectations, things, prestige and reputation over people. We lose sight of and disrespect the dignity of the human person and overlook individual circumstances, many of which we do not have full knowledge of.

But, what if we have forgiven but the relationship remains cold? While the Sacrament of Reconciliation is event-driven, absolute and complete, healing on the other hand takes time and effort, especially when painful memories resurface. To forgive does not mean to forget. We may not be able to erase memories of offences and pains, but we can accelerate healing by acknowledging the wounds we've sustained to God, asking him to heal us, and then not dwelling on them in an obsessive way.

Bad memories are like quicksand. Reliving a bad memory drags us back from reconciliation to resentment, from restoration to ruin. They rob us of peace and rekindle the desire for retaliation. The more we dwell on them, the more sordid they render all interactions, including actions with good intentions.

Bad memories conceal another insidious danger. Not only do they impede the healing of relationships, they can be cancerous to our character by distorting our perception, and making us prejudiced and judgmental.

True forgiveness entails refraining from judgment and condemnation (cf. Lk 6:37). We need humility and grace to recognise our own susceptibility and vulnerability. Therefore, Jesus ends with the assertion that “the amount you measure out is the amount you will be given back” (Lk 6:38). This implies that we will be treated the way we treat others. It underscores the interconnectedness and the reciprocal nature of generosity and kindness in human relationships.

Generosity and kindness are expressions of love and fruits of the Spirit. They enable us to value people and prevent us from engaging in fault-finding and exposing other people's weaknesses, thus engendering trust in people and God's providence. In generosity and kindness, we are not supporting people in their sin but building them up and creating space for reconciliation. David's refusal to harm Saul exemplifies this. He does not judge, blame or call out Saul's jealousy and hatred. He chooses to honour Saul as the Lord's anointed (cf. 1 Sam 26:11), thereby creating the opportunity for reconciliation.

Ultimately, difficult people and sticky situations give us powerful ways to share the Gospel. When things go bad, people need the Good News even more. It is through our behaviour, our generosity, our kindness and our forgiveness that we become witnesses of Christ's unconditional love and mercy. Anything less makes us hypocrites. It is only through grace and the desire to show love and mercy that we can become true disciples. In so doing, we recognise and overcome our relational blind spots.





Lectio: Peter: Cornerstone of Catholicism





BOOKS ON GENESIS


Over the past two weeks, the first readings of the weekday liturgy have been taken from Genesis, the first book of the Bible. The title, "Genesis", comes from the Greek word found in Gen 2:4 which translates as "the book of the generation (genesis) of the heavens and earth". In the selected readings at Mass, we recalled God's creation of the world as the beautiful habitation for man to enjoy his life with his Creator. Sadly, Adam and Eve disobeyed God and were expelled from their Edenic paradise (Gen 3:23). The horrifying account of the first murder ever committed in mankind by Cain (Gen 4:8) began the spiral of sin which led to the great flood that cleansed the world of sin. Out of His great love and mercy, God begins the renewal of humanity with Noah. It is with Noah that the word "covenant" is used for the first time in the Bible and surprisingly, the first proclamation of the gospel or "Good News" (Protoevangelium) is made by God immediately after The Fall in Gen 3:15.
