Looking Inside To See Outside

8th Sunday in Ordinary Time 2 Mar 2025

Eccles 27: 4-7 1 Cor 15: 54-58 Lk 6: 39-45

Today's readings are about looking inwards, self-reflecting and examining our inner thoughts and desires to help us develop a closer relationship with God. There is no better time to do this than before the season of Lent which begins next week, we embark on a spiritual journey to strengthen our faith.

Being self-critical is important for several reasons. First, there is a tendency for most of us to look outwards rather than inwards when trying to make sense of the world. We are quick to judge the words and actions of others, and how they relate to our own sense of what is right or wrong. It is a very human thing, one which we cannot help doing. The problem is that we are often ill-equipped to do this because of our self-centredness and prejudices. As a result, our judgment can be completely off the mark leading to strained relationships with others, including loved ones, and a warped sense of our own importance and righteousness. We tend to do this also because it is much easier to criticise others and place the onus on them changing their ways than it is to examine ourselves and transform our own lives. That is what our Lord meant in the Gospel reading when he said: "Why do you observe the splinter in your brother's eye and never notice the plank in your own? How can you

say to your brother, 'Brother, let me take out the splinter that is in your eye,' when you cannot see the plank in your own? Hypocrite!" (Lk 6:41-42) That plank is our ego and pride. It is a huge impediment which is why Jesus used the plank metaphor contrasting it to a splinter.

second reason for examination is that it leads to the most important question of all: Who am I? Ultimately, we need to confront this central issue if we are to make sense of our life, its purpose and what we must do to achieve Throughout human history, many great minds have struggled to answer the question, but with unsatisfactory results. As Christians we know that our identity can only be meaningfully determined in relation to God, that we are created by him and he has a plan for us that can only be achieved through Christ. Self-reflection brings us closer to this truth.

The second half of the Gospel reading reinforces this point: "There is no sound tree that produces rotten fruit, nor again a rotten tree that produces sound fruit...A good man draws what is good from the store of goodness in his heart; a bad man draws what is bad from the store of badness" (Lk 6:43-45). What this makes clear is that man's goodness isn't his own making or effort. It comes from God whose love has been poured into our

hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us (Rom 5:5). It is another important marker of our identity - that we are children of God, whose love and mercy for us is unconditional. On the contrary, if we believe that our goodness and achievements are purely due to our own effort, it leads to a completely different sense of who we are, one in which reconciliation with God and his plan for our salvation isn't possible.

Pope Francis brought these two points together - the importance of being self critical and how it shapes our identity - in a homily in 2022, when he said: "...the Lord invites us to clean up our gaze...He first asks us to look within ourselves, to recognise our failings... And after looking within ourselves Jesus invites us to look at others like he does...looking first not at evil but at goodness. God looks at us in this way: he does not see irredeemable errors in us, but children who make mistakes. God always distinguishes person from his errors. He always saves the person." (Pope Francis, 22 Feb 2022)

Starting our Lenten journey on this footing brings us closer to Christ so we can better celebrate the triumph he achieved for all of us through his suffering, death and resurrection.

Pope Francis' Lenten Message 2025

Journeying Together in Hope



In his latest message for Lent 2025, Pope Francis reflects on the theme "Let us journey together in hope." The Holy Father emphasizes the importance of living one's life as a constant journey of conversion, choosing to walk in peace and hope alongside others.

Three Calls to Conversion

Pope Francis identifies three areas where individuals may be in greater need of conversion:

- **Journeying with Others:** Recognise that we are all pilgrims in this life, and consider how our lives reflect this fact. Ask yourself: "Am I really on a journey, or am I standing still?"
- **Being Synodal**: Journey with others, avoiding self-absorption, exclusion, and hypocrisy. Let us walk in the same direction, attentive to one another in love and patience.
- **Having Hope**: Cultivate hope, trusting in God's promise of eternal life. Hope is the "sure and steadfast anchor of the soul".

The Call To Journey In Hope

Pope Francis encourages Catholics to focus on hope during the Lenten season. He quotes St. Paul's exclamation: "Death has been swallowed up in victory. Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?" (1 Cor15:54-55). The Holy Father also recalls a prayer of St. Teresa of Ávila, emphasizing the importance of hope in our lives.

'Hope, O my soul, hope. You know neither the day nor the hour. Watch carefully, for everything passes quickly, even though your impatience makes doubtful what is certain, and turns a very short time into a long one.'

– prayer of Saint Teresa of Avila

This hope is not abstract but must be lived concretely. Pope Francis invites us to examine whether we truly trust in God's mercy. Do we believe in His forgiveness, or do we fall into the trap of self-reliance? And do we concretely experience the hope that inspires in us "a commitment to justice and fraternity, to care for our common home and in such a way that no one feels excluded?"

As we embark on the Lenten journey, let us remember Pope Francis' message: "May the hope that does not disappoint, the central message of the jubilee, be the focus of our Lenten journey toward the victory of Easter".

MARRIAGE

Contact the Parish Office 12 months before your intended date to book the church premises and ensure that your presiding priest is able to make that date.
