The Lord is Risen, Alleluia!

Easter Sunday of the Lord's Resurrection
20 Apr 2025

Acts 10:34, 37- 43
Col 3:1-4
Jn 20:1-9

Jesus Christ is risen today; *A-lle-lu-ia!* This all-familiar hymn of joyful jubilation rings out across churches as we celebrate the triumph of Jesus' resurrection and victory over death. So, let us reawaken our senses as the readings are proclaimed. Do not become desensitised to the wonders of Easter.

The gospel begins purposefully and meaningfully: "It was very early on the **first day** of the week and still dark" (Jn 20:1). This exterior darkness symbolises the interior sadness in Mary Magdalene's heart since her beloved Jesus, 'the light of the human race' (Jn 1: 4), has died. It is an allusion that the darkness of sin in the human heart has snuffed out the 'Light of the World', resulting in utter sombreness. It was in this pre-dawn darkness and woefulness that Mary Magdalene made her solitary journey to the tomb.

But 'the first day of the week' brings hope and points to a new beginning. It draws us back to the first day of creation in Genesis when "God created the heavens and the earth" out of nothingness (cf. Gen 1:1-5). John's emphasis on the 'first day' helps us make the connection that Mary Magdalene was placed in the setting of the '**first day**' of a new creation. Dramatically, the empty tomb unveils the start of the

'new creation' sparked by the risen Christ. For us, we too become new creations at our baptisms where we die to our old selves with Christ and share in his resurrection and rebirth to new life.

What does this really mean? How does it tie in with what we profess in the Apostles' Creed at mass - that our Lord 'suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried, and rose again on the third day'? Do we truly believe what we profess?

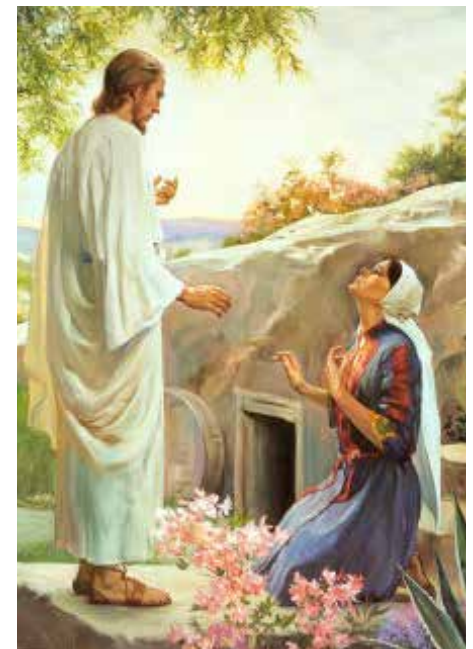
It all boils down to whether or not our own lives have changed in the light of this truth, as it did for the disciples and Mary Magdalene after they discovered the empty tomb. Over the next 40 days, they would slowly learn the real significance of Jesus' resurrection, opening their eyes to how the cross and tomb, initially signs of failure and defeat, would become symbols of the triumph of truth, goodness and love over sin and death. Their lives were dramatically changed and they began to fearlessly and zealously proclaim the Good News. Have our eyes too been opened to what the resurrection can do for our own broken lives, or are we still buried in our tombs?

Let us be rejuvenated by this poem: "And every year the dull and dead in us meets our Easter challenge: to be open to the unexpected, to believe beyond our security, to welcome God in every form, and trust in our own greening." (Excerpt: *Out of the Ordinary - Prayers, Poems, and Reflections for Every Season* - Joyce Rupp)

In truth, we do not merely celebrate Christ's resurrection as just a historical event of more than 2,000 years ago. Rather, Easter orients our messy, broken lives towards God, so that we begin to "look for the

things that are in heaven" (Col 3:1). Beyond the celebration, it must also be a day of decision as to whether or not we too will rise from the ashes of our lives by allowing the risen Lord to create us anew. We want to echo with the psalmist, "The Lord's right hand has triumphed; his right hand raised me up. I shall not die, I shall live and recount his deeds" (Ps 117:16-17).

Easter celebrates the paschal mystery that made possible our own salvation here and now, not just in the afterlife. It is, in the fullest sense, the feast of God's extravagant and total love for us. Today, let us ask for the grace to come to see and believe as John did, that we too, might live as Easter people.

About Easter

Every Catholic Should Know

"Easter is the most important liturgical time for Catholics. It celebrates Jesus' victory over sin and death and salvation for mankind. It is God's greatest act of love to redeem mankind."

2. THE WORD "EASTER" HOLDS MEANING

"The word 'Easter' comes from Old English, meaning simply the 'East.' The sun which rises in the East, bringing light, warmth, and hope, is a **symbol** for the Christian of the rising Christ, who is the true **Light** of the world." (USCCB)

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4. DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY

We celebrate Divine Mercy Sunday on the **second Sunday** of Easter.

Jesus himself expressed His desire for a feast celebrating his mercy and told Sr. Faustina that it was to be the Sunday after Easter.

"Divine Mercy! This is the Easter gift that the Church receives from the risen Christ and offers to humanity at the dawn of the third millennium."

1. EASTER ISN'T A SIMPLE HOLIDAY, IT'S AN ENTIRE SEASON!

The liturgical season of Easter lasts for **50 days**! It is the second longest in the Church calendar.

Each year, Easter falls on the first Sunday after the first full moon on or after the spring equinox and ends with the celebration of Pentecost.

3. THE OCTAVE OF EASTER

The period of Easter Sunday **until** Divine Mercy Sunday (or, the second Sunday of Easter) is called the Octave of Easter.

Easter tide is considered to be the time after the octave of Easter.



5. INCLUDES THE FEAST OF THE ASCENSION

The feast of Christ's Ascension into Heaven falls on the **40th day of Easter**.





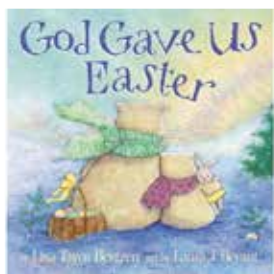

ANOIDING OF THE SICK



The sacrament can be administered to any Catholic awaiting serious surgery, suffering from serious illness or weakened by old age. Anointing may be given before admission for the anticipated medical procedure. Contact the Parish Office to request for a priest. In emergencies, priests of the church nearest to the hospital can be contacted.

INFANT BAPTISM



Spiritual preparation is held on the last Friday of every odd month. Baptism is held on the first/second Sunday of the following month. For registration, please refer to our website.

FUNERAL



Please check with the Parish Office for priest availability and Mass timing before confirming the timing at the crematorium. For prayers at the wake, please contact the Parish Office.

MARRIAGE



Contact the Parish Office 12 months before your intended date to book the church premises and ensure that your presiding priest is able to make that date.

MASS OFFERING



Mass offering envelopes are available outside the Parish Office and outside JP11 Hall. Submit your envelopes at least two weeks in advance of your intended date. Please write the names clearly, and in block letters.
