# **Divine Gems**

**Making Disciples** 

Divine Mercy Sunday 27 Apr 2025

Acts 5:12-16 Rev 1:9-13,17-19 Jn 20:19-31

Pope St. John Paul II likens Mercy to "love's second name" (*Dives In Misericordia*, 7). It's a love that helps and consoles us amidst our suffering and sin.

Divine Mercy Sunday is such an expression of God's love. It comes with a divine gem — a complete pardon of all sins and punishment.

To unlock this gift, Jesus says we just need to "go to Confession and receive Holy Communion" to "obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment" (Diary, 699). What an awesome spiritual reset! It's like a "second baptism" — we go straight to heaven if we happen to die right after receiving this grace. Theologians say it suffices to go to confession sometime during Lent, remain in a state of grace, and receive Holy Communion to obtain the promised grace.

Why this astounding generosity? St. Paul says that "where sin increased, grace abounded all the more" (Rom 5:20). God is never outdone by evil. He gives extraordinary grace to combat unparalleled evil and sin in our time. Pope St. John Paul II says that contemporary society is marked by unprecedented evil. The same advances in modern technology which make convenient, have also given evil a reach and power like never before (cf. 2002 World Day of Peace Message). He dedicates the Second Sunday of Easter as Divine Mercy Sunday because Jesus asked for it through St. Faustina, a mystic Polish nun (cf. Diary, 699).

While this spiritual gem happens once a year, other gems like the Divine Mercy Image, Divine Mercy Chaplet, and Novena to The Divine Mercy (cf. Diary, 327, 687, 1209), are devotions offered to us to unlock grace for the conversion of souls, as and when required.


Can we afford to be indifferent to God's generous outpouring of mercy? Jesus anticipates our response: "Mankind will not have peace until it turns to the fount of my mercy" (Diary, 699).

Through possessions and fleeting experiences, the world lures us with a false sense of happiness and fulfilment with no true respite from misery and despair. Divine Mercy restores the truth that real peace and joy come from a right relationship with God and our fellowmen.

In the Gospel, Jesus 'walks the talk'. He appears to his disciples on the same evening of the day of his resurrection. Though a victim, there is no rebuke, only mercy and forgiveness that transform his disciples' fears and anxieties into peace and joy (cf. Jn 20:19-20). Through mercy, the past is released, the present is relished, and the future resounds with hope. Be like the Lord, fast and first to forgive—it doesn't matter if we're right or wrong, victim or perpetrator.

God's mercy is far richer than mere forgiveness. Jesus instructs St. Faustina: "You are to show mercy to your neighbours ... by deed ... by word ... by prayer. In these three degrees is contained the fullness of mercy" (Diary, 742).

These lofty demands also apply to us. Having received mercy, we are



obliged to show mercy in everything we do.

The crux of Divine Mercy lies in seeing a troubled world through the lens of God's mercy. To allow God to use us like prisms to melt hardened hearts and spread the message that there is no sin God can't forgive. We are to trust in God and recognise Jesus as our Saviour. The early Church epitomises Divine Mercy. In the First Reading, the Good News, supercharged with miraculous works of mercy, converts sinners and saves souls in the name of Jesus (cf. Acts 5:14-16).

While Easter celebrates the resurrection and new life, Divine Mercy Sunday reinforces God's love and reminds us to be merciful in all things — interpersonal, evangelical, charitable. Jesus makes it easy to access abundant grace for our spiritual battles.

In the context of salvation history, it is not through divine pity but love and mercy that God adopts us into his divine family. The gems are beautiful and worth wearing. Jesus, we trust in you.



# **Early Life and Priesthood**

Jorge Mario Bergoglio, now known as Pope Francis, was born on December 17, 1936, in Buenos Aires, Argentina. He entered the Society of Jesus (Jesuits) and was ordained as a priest on December 13, 1969. Pope Francis' priestly ministry was marked by his commitment to serving the poor and marginalized.

## **Pontificate**

On March 13, 2013, Bergoglio was elected as the 266th Pope of the Catholic Church, taking the papal name Francis in honour of Saint Francis of Assisi. As Pope, Francis has emphasized the importance of mercy, compassion, and care for the environment.



# Witness to Life and Hope

Despite health challenges, including mobility issues and respiratory problems, Pope Francis continues to inspire millions worldwide with his message of hope and love. His illnesses have not deterred him from fulfilling his papal duties, and he remains a powerful symbol of resilience and devotion.



# A Tribute to Pope Francis by St Jerome Library

"The Name of God is Mercy" was Pope Francis' first book in his pontificate. It was published in 2016 in the Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy which began on the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception and concluded on the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe (8 December 2015 - 20 November 2016). In just 95 pages, Pope Francis shared his insights on God's mercy as fully revealed in the sacrifice of Jesus Christ on the cross (p40). He encouraged the faithful as





Church, not to perceive of God's mercy in an abstract way (p19) but truly experience divine mercy in the Sacrament of Reconciliation or Confession (p95).


