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"May All Be One"

7th Sunday of Easter World Social Communications Sunday 1 Jun 2025

Ac 7:55-60 Rev 22:12-14, 16-17, 20 Jn 17:20-26

On this 7th Sunday of Easter, we are encouraged to observe and promote World Social Communications Sunday. There is much to learn from the readings on how to communicate God's divine truth in a world struggling with selfishness, hatred, and division.

In the First Reading, St Stephen sees a vision of Jesus sitting at the right hand of the Father. Fortified by the Holy Spirit, he affirms Jesus' true identity as the Son of God. This outrages the Sanhedrin, and he is stoned to death.

Having fortitude "enables one to conquer fear, even fear of death, and to face trials and persecutions ... even to renounce and sacrifice his life in defence of a just cause" (CCC 1808). St Stephen's fortitude inspires us to contemplate our challenges and the resilience required to communicate truthfully and uphold ethical standards, especially in today's digital age, where social media is rife with innuendos and half-truths that sow discord and cause harm. We are invited to reflect on our commitment to fostering unity and understanding, promoting the Gospel, and building a more just and compassionate world, even in the face of unforgiveness, threats, and dangers.

In the Second Reading, St John proclaims the eternal nature of God and his sovereignty over creation: "I am the Alpha and the Omega, the First and the Last, the Beginning and the End" (Rev 22:13). This revelation encourages us to remain steadfast in faith and anticipate the fulfilment of God's promises. The washing of the robes symbolises purification, achieved through trials, tribulations, repentance, and the Sacrament of Reconciliation. It alludes to the final purification in purgatory for those who are still imperfectly purified, a step towards achieving the holiness necessary to enter Heaven (cf. CCC 1030).

How prepared are we to share this challenging message, especially in a world plagued by relativism? Today, truth and moral values tend to be shaped by cultural, social, historical, or personal circumstances rather than being objective and universally applicable. By asserting the truth of our faith, we are essentially revealing the existence of right and wrong, prompting a deeper reflection on our actions and a return to the Lord who loves us and desires our return home. The Lord promises us a wellspring of his grace: "Then let all who are thirsty come: all who want it may have the water of life, and have it free" (Rev 22:17). But do we truly desire it?

Finally, in the Gospel, Jesus prays "not only for these, but for those also who through their words will believe in me" (Jn 17:20). He is praying for us, the Church. He wants us to be united as one body of Christ, and to be "so completely one that the world will realise that it was you who sent me" (Jn 17: 23). This unity of the body of Christ "subsists in the Catholic Church as something she can never lose" (CCC 820). The unity of the Church is a sign for the world. A sign that shines like a beacon

proclaiming to the world that God is alive and present here today - that he loves us and wants us to return to him. The foremost bond of unity is charity that "binds everything together in perfect harmony" (CCC 815). We are called to be charitable in thoughts, words, and deeds.

World Social Communications Sunday serves as a reminder that for our message to be impactful, we must lead authentic Christian lives. It is crucial to reflect on how we can embody Christ's love and unity through our discipleship and interactions, rather than solely focusing on what we say or the communication media we use.

Do we bear witness to God's love through how we live and communicate? Or are we contributing to strife and division? Let us courageously proclaim the truth and be united with our brothers and sisters in Christ, seeking the Holy Spirit's grace and fortitude to be kind, gentle, and forgiving.

59TH WORLD SOCIAL COMMUNICATIONS SUNDAY

Share with gentleness the hope that is in your hearts

(1 Peter 3:15-16)

The late Pope Francis' message for the 59th World Day of Social Communications, delivered on 24 January 2025, calls for a transformation in how we communicate, urging a shift from divisive rhetoric to a communication that fosters hope, unity, and empathy.



Disarming Communication

He calls for "disarming" communication by rejecting aggression, manipulation, and divisive rhetoric. He warns that digital media often fragments society and promotes hostility. True hope, he says, is a courageous, transformative virtue that requires honest, respectful dialogue and a commitment to the common good.

Accounting with gentleness for the hope that is in us

He reflects on Christian communication through the lens of 1 Peter 3:15–16, urging believers to share the hope within them with gentleness and reverence. He highlights three key messages:

- 1. Hope has a face the risen Christ, whose presence sustains believers even in dark times.
- 2. Witness through life Christians are called to live in a way that naturally invites questions about their hope.
- 3. Gentle communication our responses should foster connection, empathy, and dignity, not defensiveness or division.

He envisions a kind of communication that uplifts, inspires, and walks with others, focusing on truth, beauty, and solidarity in a fractured world.

Hoping together

He emphasises that hope is a shared journey, not a solitary one. The Jubilee Year invites everyone to begin anew, embraced by God's mercy, and to walk together in solidarity.

He highlights the social dimension of hope, calling attention to the marginalized, prisoners, and those in need of compassion. Communicators are urged to seek out and share hidden stories of goodness—"nuggets of hope"—to counter indifference and inspire unity.

This kind of hopeful, attentive communication can build community, reduce isolation, and remind us of the power of walking together in hope.

Do not forget the heart

He urges communicators to care for their hearts amid rapid technological progress. He calls for communication that is gentle, hopeful, and healing, grounded in empathy and human connection.

Avoid reacting instinctively or aggressively; instead, speak to the dignity of others and nurture trust, even in difficult times. Share stories that reflect the quiet resilience of hope in suffering, and work to build bridges, foster care, and promote unity.

With God's grace, he says, we can all help write a future rooted in compassion and shared hope.

This kind of hopeful, attentive communication can build community, reduce isolation, and remind us of the power of walking together in hope.
